Four Regiments of Seventh Russian Army Mutiny; Kerensky Orders Arrest and Courtmartial of all Responsible.

PEACE DELEGATES FROM AUSTRIA INCLUDE PRINCE

PETROGRAD, June 9.—Four regiments of the seventh Russian army refused to obey officers. It is reported that another regiment arrested its own officers.

Three weeks ago Austrian General Bohr selected two peace delegates from every division of Austrian troops on that particular part of the front, totaling 120 men.

Early this week 120 Austrians, bearing white flags and blowing bugles, advanced to the Russian lines. The Russians met the enemy.

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DISASTER AT SANSALVADOR EXAGGERATED

NEW YORK, June 8.—Reports of loss of life and property damage were greatly exaggerated in the San Salvador earthquake, according to cables Bloom Brothers have received.

The consulate of San Salvador said here if the earthquake was marked by heavy loss of life, information concerning it would have come to the consulate officially.

JAIL AWAITS UNREGISTERED OF DRAFT AGE

ORDERS RECEIVED FOR ROUNDING UP OF ALL WHO FAILED TO LIST THEMSELVES.

A drive for slackers is to be commenced by federal, state, county and city officials, according to word from Portland where Adjutant General White has been notified that all men between 21 and 21 who failed to register Tuesday must be rounded up and placed under arrest.

UNKNOWN PERSON BATTLES GUARD SHOOTING AFFRAY AT CAMPBELL THREE BULLETS ALL GO ASTRAY

Guardmen of Company M, who have been standing guard over the bridges and tunnels of the O-W. R. & N. in this county for the past few months, are very much on the qui vive these days and have ceased to regard their work as boys play as a result of an exchange of shots the other night between a guardman at Campbell station and an unknown person.

Reports have been current in Pendleton for several days about a shooting at Campbell and they have varied from an affair of serious aspect to an incident born of a nervous illusion. The railroad authorities have fostered the latter belief and have attempted to suppress the facts but the best accounts obtainable indicate that there was more to the affair than "nerves."

According to the most reliable account of the incident, a member of Co. M, new to guard duty, was guarding one end of the tunnel when suddenly a rock or bullet struck his lantern and broke it. Behind a signal post, about 100 yards away, the guard saw a man and promptly took a shot at him. The man returned the fire once and then started to run.

Since the shooting, the guardmen are very much on the alert, it is said. The matter was investigated by railroad men and also by a special secret agent who is reported to have declared that a man answering the same description had caused similar trouble at other places. The features of the man were plainly visible to the guardmen because of the moonlight.

PATRIOTISM TO BE BASIS OF FOOD CONTROL DURING WAR; AUTOCRATIC MEASURES ONLY AS A LAST RESORT

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Patriotism will be made the basis of food control during the war and autocratic measures will not be utilized except as a last resort.

From farm to kitchen with regulation prices and the supply administered through voluntary agreement is the idea, according to the plans of Hoover. Hoover plans to have a control body for each product coming under his department. This body will be composed of representatives of every link in the chain, from producer to consumer and will perfect a voluntary arrangement designed to conserve the food supply and reduce prices.

Here is outline of plan. Here's Hoover's plan with wheat as an example. They will reach an agreement on the price of wheat, say \$1.50 per bushel.
