BAKER JUDGE BEATEN IN BITTER CAMPAIGN

J. B. Messick Recalled by 32 Votes; W. J. Doby Made Successor.

BAKER, Ore., June 8.—Official count today showed that County Judge J. B. Messick had been recalled by a plurality of 32 votes, that William J. Doby had been elected his successor and that the attempt to recall Commissioner J. P. Ritter had failed.

The vote was completed just before noon, Mr. Doby was sworn in at once and immediately began his duties.

The vote of Baker county on the recall of Judge Messick was: For, 2166; against, 2134. That on the recall of Commissioner Ritter was: For, 1927; against, 2129. The vote on the election of a successor to Judge Messick was: Doby, 2171; Messick, 2075. The vote on the possible successor to Mr. Ritter had he been recalled, was: Ritter, 2144; John Fraser, 2022.

Germany Starts Big Counter. PARIS, June 8.—Germany has apparently started a counter offensive on a great section of the French front. Violent enemy bombardment around St. Quentin and Laifree is officially reported. German attacks failed. Last night was the most animated on the entire front. North of Month Laffoux and south of Elpils in the Carnoy sector the artillery fire was most violent. "We penetrated the enemy lines toward Souilly Hill, in the region east of Belfort and took prisoners," the statement said.
