LIVE NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 12.—

With the approach of the dry season in the northwest, Washington lumbermen are inquiring of the state forestry department at Olympia as to methods of fire patrol prescribed by the state law of 1917. This act requires the maintenance of private patrol against forest fire danger, either individually or through associations on penalty of the state doing the work and assessing it to the owner. In answer to such inquiry, F. E. Pape, state forester and fire warden, today condensed the important requirements of the new patrol law into the following statement: "Timber owners may comply with the law by organizing or becoming members of forest fire associations whose patrol is approved by the state board of forest commissioners, or one or more timber owners may furnish private patrol for their timber lands, in which case they will be required to make affidavit to the state board that they will furnish patrol and protection for their lands of equal standard, efficiency and duration to that maintained by the forest fire organizations which have been approved by the state board. As a further requirement the patrolman or ranger employed on such patrol must furnish the board with an affidavit that he has been authorized and instructed by his employer to incur any expense necessary to promptly control and extinguish fire occurring on their lands and to cooperate with and make such reports to the supervising warden and state forester as is required of other forest officers."

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12.—The Rose Festival Championship of the Portland Gun Club, one of the principal events of the 1917 season is being shot today. The contest today consists of 100 targets to be shot in five strings of 20 birds each. The Rose Festival association has donated a handsome silver trophy for the winner and the gun club has put up five trophies to be shot for under the Lewis class system. Gun experts from all parts of the northwest are taking a hand in the contest today.

TACOMA, June 12.—After being closed to fishermen for the last three years, the lakes in stamper National park are open today and are expected to attract many parties of fishermen during the summer. The lakes were stocked three years ago and the fishing now is declared to be unusually good.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C., June 12.—The British Columbia Construction & Engineering company today has a contract from the Imperial Munitions Board for the construction of four ships. The boats will be built at Poplar Island and the site for the shipyard is now being cleared. This is the first authoritative announcement of a contract awaited by the munitions board to a New Westminster firm.
