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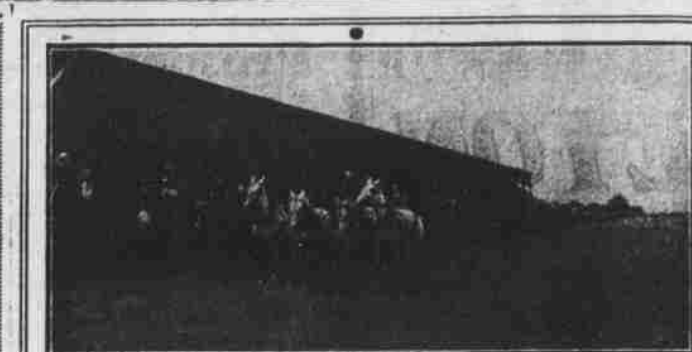

DEMAND FOR FOOD QUALITY CATTLE

PORTLAND, June 12.—It begins to look as if California is dumping all its inferior quality cattle on the Portland market and sending its best stuff to the middle west.

Recent arrivals from the south would clearly indicate this fact, because nothing has arrived from there of late that would even be called moderately good. In fact, most of the arrivals would be in the junk class.

Prices being paid for this class of stuff are better at Portland than at competitive markets, and this is the reason why the shipments are being rushed in this direction.

There is a demand for a better quality cattle than has been received here recently. As nothing of this character has been available of late it is impossible to tell what is the exact top of the market. For any material lots the trade does not figure above anything over \$3.50 a head, although it is quite possible that a single load of something extra good would bring a dime again.
