NEWS OF PENDLETON

Circuit Phelps to Portland.

Circuit Judge G. W. Phelps will leave tomorrow for Portland where he is to assist in holding court there during the next few weeks.

Estate Is Appraised.

L. C. Scharpf, H. G. Casteel and C. A. Cooper, appraisers of the estate of the late Anna M. Cummins, have filed their report estimating the property to be worth \$974.45.

Roscoe M. Kirkpatrick, 33, died this morning at the Eastern Oregon State Hospital and the body is being prepared for shipment to Hood River from which place he was committed two years ago. Deceased was the son of O. L. Kirkpatrick, of Hood River. He was a member of the I. O. O. F.

Time Limit for Petition.

The school board has fixed tomorrow evening at 5 o'clock as the time limit for the filing of petitions nominating candidates for director of the school district. There is no law, so far as the school authorities can find fixing a time limit but some time must be fixed in order to give the board an opportunity to print the ballots.

Believes Hog Had Rabies.

E. J. Dresser, a Goshute Hill rancher, yesterday sent the head of one of his hogs to Dr. David N. Rosenberg, state health officer, for examination. He believes the animal exhibited symptoms of rabies before it died and he is afraid that his other hogs are infected. A report is expected by tomorrow.

Trappers Are Quitting.

Because of the rapid advance of wages in other lines of work, a good many of the government trappers are quitting their jobs. E. F. Averill, district inspector for the biological survey, left last night for the Willamette valley to replace several trappers who had resigned to accept more remunerative employment. In some places as high as \$100 a month and expenses are being paid for sheepherders.

Attachment Suit Filed.

The poles are 20 feet above the ground and topped with a gilded ball. Flags will be flown from all every day. The Court street business men subscribed the money for putting up the poles.

Iley Winn, well known farmer who is worth \$200,000 according to the allegations in the complaint, was yesterday afternoon sued for a divorce by his wife, Della Will. She asks for half the real property and a liberal allowance for the support of herself and their four children. Cruel and inhuman treatment is her alleged grounds. They have been married about 13 years. Raley & Raley and H. J. Warner are attorneys for the plaintiff.

Bingham Springs Open Sunday.

Bingham Springs will formally open for the summer season on next Sunday, according to W. W. Hoch, proprietor, who is down today. On Saturday night of this week he will give a big dance in the old pavilion which has been remodeled and where all dances are to be given this year. The roads are in fair condition and the fishing is excellent, he reports. The hotel and annex have been remodeled new dressing rooms have been built and five new cottages have been built. Mr. Hoch expects a big season despite his lateness.

FOOD BILL IS DOUBLED FOR STATE WARDS

Because of the advanced prices for foodstuffs the cost of groceries for the Eastern Oregon State Hospital and for the other institutions of the state has practically doubled over former prices. This was disclosed when the state board secured new contracts for supplies a few days ago.

Dr. McNary has not completed his calculations as to what the additional cost will be at the institution but the increases will be similar to those at Salem where Dr. E. L. Steiner estimates the cost of foodstuffs for the year will be \$15,000 more than for last year.

Flour contracted for the institution here last year at \$4.20 is now contracted at \$7.35 and the new bid is \$11 per barrel.

Beans formerly purchased by the state at from four to five cents a pound now cost 11 and 12 cents. Sugar is 50 per cent higher than formerly and the same is true of most all other staple foods.

William Harrison Wood Dies at St. Anthony's Hospital Yesterday Afternoon of Appendicitis.

William Harrison Wood, a well known farmer of Athena, died yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock at St. Anthony's hospital of appendicitis. The body will be taken to Athena where the funeral is to be held at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Interment will be made in the Weston cemetery.

Deceased was 54 years old, having been born in Sullivan county, Missouri, Nov. 11, 1869. He had been a resident of this county for the past 46 years. His farm was located between Athena and Weston. During the past year he had made his home in the town of Athena.

He had never married but is survived by two brothers and four sisters as follows: James and Otto Wood of Athena, Mrs. Alf Johnson of Walla Walla, Mrs. Daley Stanton and Mrs. Fannie McFarland of Athena and Mrs. Lizzie Patton of this city.
