was through with its campaign when others had just started. Not only that but our workers are proceeding in a systematic manner. They are trying to apportion the burden fairly and to this end they are keeping a card index tab on all who give or refuse to give. In this way future work will be greatly simplified. By such records the patriotic giver may be known and he may be held down if in his enthusiasm he wishes to go beyond his means. On the other hand the slacker, the copperhead and the potential traitor are kept listed for future reference. It is valuable to have such information.

THE WORST SLACKER

THE slacker of whom the nation needs beware is not the young man of military age who strives to evade liability. There are such men it is true and they deserve strict handling, but after all they are few in numbers and personally worthless so are of little military value. It may be set down as assured that the manhood of the country will be loyal and ready to meet the wishes of the government, whenever called upon.

The big menace is from slackers of a different type. It arises from the work of men who capitalize the war situation for their own benefit without regard to the morality or patriotism of their sections. It is his manifestations in market manipulations and the cornering and storage of food for price boosting purposes. It is typified also by the action of men in congress, democrats and republicans, who strive to block legislation for the protection of the people along this line.

There is occasion for good profits for producer and manufacturer and no one will object to such profits. But there is ground for objection when flour costs more in this country than in France when the French make their flour from American wheat which they have to ship through the submarine zone. There is objection to allowing speculators to corner any line of foodstuffs and then sell it for several times as much as they paid the producer for it. Such operations are piratical.

One of the critical battles of the war is now being fought in the United States congress over the subject of food control. The legislation desired by the President is vital to our success in war. Those who try to block such legislation work for Germany and against the United States. They render the kaiser a greater service than they could possibly give him if they wore a Teuton uniform and fought our troops upon the field.

THE PLACE FOR TRAITORS

THE suffragettes who on the visit of the Russian commission to the White House flaunted banners saying

Wilson and Root are deceiving Russia could have been prompted by no desire to aid the suffrage cause. They dealt equal suffrage a heavy blow. Their actions are accountable only on the ground that they were instigated by parties working in behalf of Germany and against the United States. In that event their work was treasonable and the pickets may be thankful they escaped hanging. For those who enjoy the protection of the American flag and our government yet persist in giving aid and comfort for the enemy there can be no patience and none is deserved. Such people should be kept in jail until the end of the war and then invited to quit our shores.

Men of military age and without dependents may escape the draft law by enlisting during the week from June 23-30; however, there will be no odium connected with the draft this time so many may prefer to wait for the first 500,000.
