Elks Meeting Tonight.

The wool sale scheduled for Monday has been postponed until June 23 inasmuch as not all the wool is ready. A sale will be held at Heppner on June 25 and there will be none until that date.

Victim of Accident Buried.
The remains of "Doc" Carroll, who was accidentally killed at Hermiston yesterday by a freight train, were buried today at Olney cemetery. Coroner Brown investigated the accident yesterday and brought the body to Pendleton.

Natatorium Thief's Bust.
The natatorium thief is early on the job this year. Yesterday a half dozen different patrons of the swimming pool lost valuables from their clothes while they were in the pool. In all about \$25 was stolen while one man lost his war census registration card.

Carnival May Come Here.
A carnival may come to Pendleton for the week beginning July 30. A representative appeared before the council last evening and offered \$200 for the privilege of knowing here on the hitching grounds in the east end of the city. The matter was left up to the license committee.

More Gas Monday.
A number of gas consumers in Pendleton have been complaining lately of weak gas. Dr. F. W. Vincent, manager of the P. & L. Co., stated this morning that the new retort would be ready Monday and would eliminate any more trouble. Meanwhile if consumers will regulate the ventilation holes at the base of their burners he thinks they will not be bothered. The consumption of gas jumped up 10,000 feet in a single day and the company has had difficulty in keeping up a supply while the new retort could be fired.
