LONDON, June 20.—Kilts may replace trousers for civilian dress. England considers adopting them as a result of the government's advice that men should wear material of one hue to economize in dye stuffs.

\$10,000,000 CONCERN FAILS HAD \$9 DEPOSIT IN BANKS

Authorities tracing \$100,000,000 entrusted to concern to be sent abroad.

NEW YORK, June 20.—Of the big force once maintained by Kennedy, Mitchell & Co., Inc., a \$10,000,000 corporation, at 35 Wall street, only two clerks remained today. An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed against the firm late yesterday, and the sheriff seized the offices on a judgment for \$200,000 obtained by L. H. Bigelow & Co. on a bill for stationery.

Assistant District Attorney Deering is still awaiting reply to cables sent in an effort to learn the disposition of \$100,000,000 entrusted to the firm by small Hungarian bankers in this country to be transmitted to Hungary.

Nothing has been learned as to whether the president of the concern, William A. Kennedy, formerly of Farmington, Mo., has reached Spain. When he left, Kennedy said he was going to France to look after a \$400,000,000 franc contract.

MAY BUY LIQUOR TRADE

British House of Commons Today Plan Is Now Considered.

LONDON, June 20.—Recent reports that the government was considering the desirability of purchasing the liquor trade were confirmed in the house of commons today by Chancellor Bonar Law. He gave assurances that the house would be equipped before the completion of such action. Commissioners have been appointed by the cabinet to consider the question.

CORN MEAL AND WATER NOT A PRESERVATIVE

WASHINGTON, June 20.—There is no corn meal and water preservative for vegetables. A report to this effect recently published, and credited to the United States Department of Agriculture, probably originated from the fact that a mixture of corn meal and water had been used by a department specialist to start the lactic-acid ferment in call potatoes put to his feed in the form of sludge. This starter has been used in the case of vegetables fermented for food but it is not the preservative ferment the specialists explain. It still starts the fermentation. It is not recommended for household use, however. The same purpose is better served, as recently announced in connection with the fermentation process of preserving vegetables for food, by the addition of

GRAIN SITUATION CLEARS

Railroads Can Move All of Old Crop Before Now Ready.

NEW YORK, June 20.—A State report that the grain transportation situation shows marked improvement was authorized here tonight by Paul S. Harrison, chairman of the railroad war board. Reports from the 23 principal grain carrying roads, the statement says, show there is comparatively little car shortage affecting train movements and that there is

practically no disposition on the part of the farmers or country elevators to hold back on shipments.

A summary of the replies, the statement says, shows that the old grain can be moved before the new crop is ready, that few country elevators are full and that nearly every car ordered for grain is used to capacity for that purpose.

\$200 INCOME TAX EXEMPTION FOR EACH DEPENDENT CHILD

Proposal Approved by Senate Committee; Reduction in Charge on Bank Checks.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—An income tax exemption allowance of \$200 for each dependent child of a taxable parent and reduction of the recent stamp tax on bank checks to 1 cent were decisions reached today by the Senate Finance Committee reviewing the war tax bill.

Other stamp taxes tentatively approved were formally approved today with little change from the house provision.

It is a tie, a motion to reconsider the committee's action in exempting all dependents from taxation was lost in an effort to place a tax upon high grade candy. The committee also rejected a motion to exempt bequests and legacies from income and existing inheritance taxes.
