PAY WOMEN SAME AS MEN.

No Sex Discrimination in Navy, Says Secretary Daniels. WASHINGTON, June 22.—Women employed by the navy department are to receive the same pay as men holding similar positions. Secretary Daniels, who with several other department heads, announced recently that during the war women would be given preference in filling clerical jobs, wrote today in response to a query from Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the American National Woman's Suffrage association:

"I can assure you there is no intention on the part of this department to discriminate against women employees. All positions in the department are graded and the same rate of pay applied to each position, regardless of the sex of the individual."

LIBERTY LOAN IS \$2,800,000,000.

This Estimate Believed to Be Substantially Correct. WASHINGTON, June 22.—The full extent of the nation's response to the Liberty loan was still in the realm of conjecture last night, although indications were that the estimate of \$2,800,000,000 would be substantially correct. Only four districts—Philadelphia, Cleveland, Chicago and St. Louis—had reported official subscriptions to the treasury and these were not disclosed.
