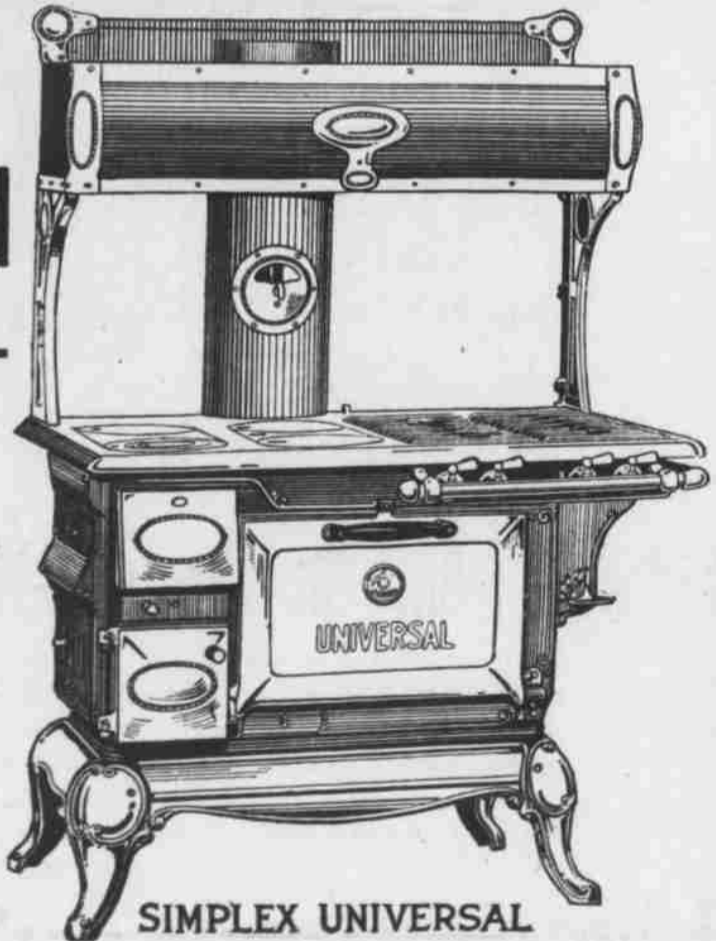

The change can be made from coal or wood to gas by the simple turning of a lever. A child can operate it.

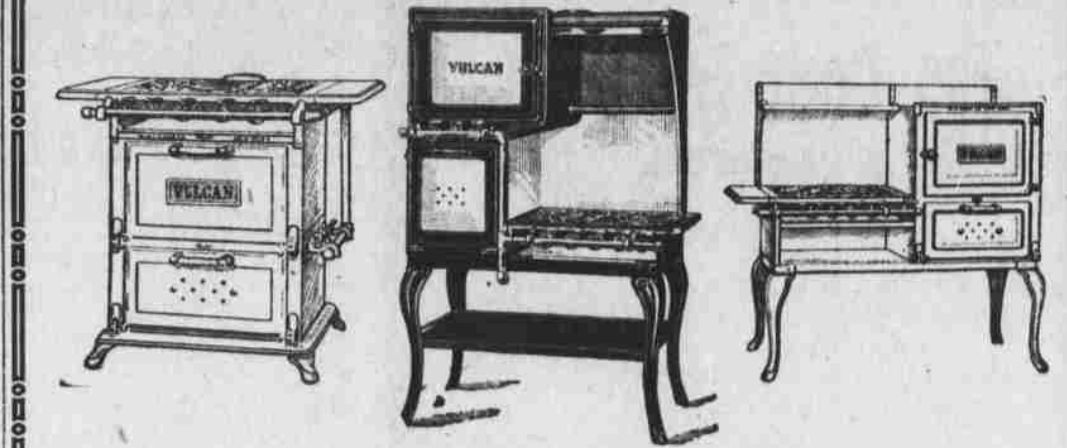
