HAT FUR WILL BE A FASHION LEADER IN PARIS NEXT WINTER

Popularized by **Hilf Soldiers**. Make Money by **Killing Rodents** Which Infest Trenches.

PARIS, June 29.—"Gaspardine" will be the most fashionable fur for next winter's wear, the costumers and furriers announce. Already they are showing coats, collars, stoles and mufflers of "Gaspardine" which simply is the fur from the rats which infest the trenches at the battle front.

Patriotic cooperation between the furriers and the soldiers will result in a strong demand for these "rat skins" and may increase the bounty of one sou per head given by the army for each rat killed in the trenches. Many soldiers spend their spare time hunting rats and terriers are numerous at the front. Some postals earn tidy sums of extra money, with the aid of the dogs, and it is to aid them that the fashion makers are popularizing "Gaspardine."

FEDERAL GRAND JURY BUSY

Anti-Registration Conspiracy is Probed at Helena.

HELENA, Mont., June 29.—Murder, anti-registration conspiracy against the government, and embezzlement of \$15,000 in postal funds are among the charges contained in the 27 indictments returned this morning by a federal grand jury which has been in session here since June 15 and which, having finished its work, was discharged today by Judge George M. Bonbrun. As usual, a number of bootleggers were indicted.

GERMAN DYNAMITER GETS LIMIT

Boston Judge Gives Reservist 18 Months in Pen.

BOSTON, June 29.—Federal Judge Norton today sentenced Werner Horn, a German reservist, to the Atlanta penitentiary for 18 months for illegally transporting dynamite on a passenger train from New York to Vancouver, B. C., to be used in an attempt to destroy the international bridge across the St. Croix river. He also was ordered to pay a fine of \$1000.

It was the maximum penalty on the charge under which Horn was convicted here two weeks ago.

ALL GOOD CALIFORNIA CATTLE SOLD

PORTLAND, June 29.—There never was any better evidence of the excellent condition of the cattle market and the prosperous outlook for the future of the 1917 grass season than the report brought back to this city by Harry Coffold, cattle salesman of Kidwell & Caswell, livestock commission men at the stockyards, who has just returned from a trip to the "beast estate in Southern California."

According to Mr. Coffold, who has made a very thorough research of the situation, practically all of the good cattle in the south have already been sold, and the only remaining lots are odds and ends and dairy stuff. Even for these the Southern California buyers are bidding such excellent prices at the moment that it would not be profitable to ship them the long distance to Portland.

While further shipments of cattle from Southern California will come to Portland this season, this will consist practically entirely of lots already sold, unless there is a radical change in the situation, there.

WANTS BIG AIR NAVY

Howard E. THE MORE ENEMIES, THE MORE HONOR," GEN. VON BLUME SAYS

War Will Be Decided Before an Increase of Present Forces Can Be Developed, He Predicts.

AMSTERDAM, June 29.—The German Gazette publishes a review of the military situation, in which General Blume writes:

"With head erect and gaze full of contempt, we come to a consideration of the nations which since the beginning of the year have joined our enemies, the United States in the forefront of them. The more enemies, the more honor."

Gen. von Blume declares the increased powers of Germany's enemies is not such as to evoke anxiety and he argues that the war will be decided before an increase in present forces of the enemies can be developed.

WOMAN KILLS HERSELF WHEN COMPANION DIES

Tragedy Ends Supposed Naval Officer and New York Woman in Philadelphia Hotel.

PHILADELPHIA, June 29.—The bodies of a man and woman were found last night in a room at the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel. It is believed that the man was a naval officer.
