dent Wilson. Those men speak with authority and the kaiser knows it.

In time the German people are going to learn that their military machine is up against a situation it cannot hope to handle. Their lines will be thrown back farther and farther, starvation will come closer and closer to their doors and their submarines will be unable to starve England. In time these facts will penetrate the German mind and with it will come realization that the blame for Germany's misfortune belongs directly at the door of the kaiser and his autocratic advisers who started the war of their own free will and have conducted it along lines that have aroused world wide indignation and hate.

When the truth dawns in Germany there will be a real upheaval and the talking will not be done by the Hollwogs.

**IT TREATS ALL ALIKE**

THE draft law now in force in this country is similar in principle to the laws upon the subject in all the large nations engaged in the war. The principle of compulsory service, with certain exemptions, is used not only because it is the fair way of providing for the national defence but it is also the business-like way.

In the draft law of civil war days there was one feature that differed vitally from the present law. At that time men of wealth were allowed to hire substitutes to take their place if they wished to do so. Therefore the law was discriminatory and much of the indignation against the draft arose from that feature.

Generally speaking the present compulsory service law is going to work well because it provides for no favoritism. The average American resents being imposed upon but he is not by nature cold footed nor is he a complainer. His chief desire is that he gets a square deal and this he is assured under the terms of the law that now calls him to the flag.

**A TIME FOR LOYALTY**

IT is said that prospective I. W. W. trouble makers have a feeling that Umatilla county people might be rough in dealing with them if anything in the way of grain burning should be started here. They may be right in that suspicion. With the country at war and our grain crop urgently needed it is no time to expect patience for agitators who may try to interrupt harvesting or destroy the wheat after it has been threshed and sacked. No loyal American will fail to stand by his country in such a crisis as this and it is a good time to make your loyalty plain.

**THE GERMANS' FAILING MORALE**

THAT the Germans are not fighting with their old spirit has been evident for some time. On every front they have abandoned the offensive. In France for the last year they have been under such pressure that their desperate efforts at resistance leave them little strength for attack. This week it was the Russians' turn, after long inactivity, to deal them a staggering blow.

The figures cited by Major Gen. Maurice, director of military operations at the British war office tell their own story. Since the beginning of April the British and French in France have captured 63,222 German prisoners, 409 field and heavy guns, 503 trench mortars and 1,318 machine guns. The victories they have won since the spring drive started are to be measured not so much in the square miles of territory gained as in the terrible losses inflicted upon the enemy. The number of prisoners taken by the Germans has

been relatively small, at best a few hundred here and there, where the Allies have tens of thousands.

Since their failure at Verdun the Germans have been steadily going backward. Their armies are losing some of their fighting edge. Hindenburg's strategic withdrawal at the Somme was a forced confession that the Allies had gained control of the situation. It was executed as he boasted, with the purpose of upsetting their preparations for an attack on a grand scale this year, but it was barely over before they had smashed his lines at both ends. With less self-assurance the German field marshal this week predicted: "If we hold our ground against enemy attacks until the submarine has done its work the war is won for us." He admits that not the armies in the field but the U boats must save Germany from defeat.

The Germans are not beaten, but it is evident that the strain of disastrous war into which the kaiser drove them is telling, and telling heavily.
