### AVIATOR SAVED FROM DEATH

Climbs From Seaplane When It Falls Into San Diego Bay.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., July 12.—Lieutenant D. C. Eimmons of the North Island signal corps aviation school fell 50 feet today in a Martin seaplane into the waters of San Diego bay when his machine went into a sudden slip. The aviator quickly unstrapped himself from his seat and climbed out on the wings of the machine, from which he was rescued by sailors from a United States warcraft anchored a few feet away. Lieutenant Eimmons was not hurt.

Official flying records made public at the signal corps aviation school on North Island today showed that military aviators in the first six months of this year made 3547 flights for a total time aloft of 5193 hours, covering some 464,000 miles. In June of this year student aviators at North Island flew a greater distance than all the aviators at the island did in the entire year of 1915.
