SUGAR PRICES HAVE SMALL EFFECT ON COST OF PRESERVING:

Lily Maxworth Wallace, National President Associated Clubs of Domestic Science, says that less than one-fifth of the contents of an average quart jar of canned fruit is added sugar.

It appears from the official figures of the United States government, taking the average of 45 of the leading industrial cities of the United States, that the average retail price of sugar during the last five years, as of March 15th, has been as follows:

1912	5.4 cents lb.
1913	5.4 cents lb.
1914	5.1 cents lb.
1915	6.6 cents lb.
1916	7.4 cents lb.
1917	8.7 cents lb.

When we realize that less than 1-5 of the contents of an average quart jar of canned fruit (6 3/4 oz., to be exact) is added sugar, it is readily demonstrated that the increased cost of preserving because of the increased cost of sugar is less than 1-12c per quart jar more

than five years ago when sugar was unusually cheap.

We arrive at this deduction by taking the average cost of sugar in 1912—5.4 cents per lb., or 2.3 cents per quart jar of fruit—compared with the average cost of sugar today at 9c a pound, or 3.8 cents per quart jar of fruit.

When compared with the rise of sugar in 1916, the increased cost per quart jar of fruit because of the higher cost of sugar in 1917 is but 6-10 of a cent per jar.

We mention this to show the fallacy which prevails among American housewives generally, that the high prices of sugar materially affect the cost of putting up fruit in jars. We are looking forward to this being one of the busiest seasons we have ever experienced on fruit jars, and if those interested in the sale of sugar and fruit jars would bear the above facts in mind, some of the erroneous beliefs of many housewives would be corrected.
