PIONEER WOMAN DIES AT HER ATHENA HOME

Mrs. Elizabeth Stamper Passes Away Thursday Afternoon, Aged 82 Years 8 Months and 15 Days.

(East Oregonian Special.) ATHENA, July 14.—Mrs. Elizabeth Stamper died Thursday afternoon at the home of her son, G. W. Bush, at the age of 82 years, 8 months and 15 days. She had been ill for a number of years, the immediate cause of her death being due to paralysis. Mrs. Stamper was one of the few remaining pioneers who came to Umatilla county in the early 70's, coming to this county 44 years ago. Since last fall Mrs. Stamper has been living in Athena with her son. She leaves two daughters, Mrs. B. F. Swagart and Mrs. James Stamper and three sons, Mill, Willis and Tobe. The funeral was held at 2 o'clock today at the M. E. church. Rev. Walter G. Gleiser officiated. The burial took place in the Athena cemetery.

LEAVES ENTIRE ESTATE, \$35, TO PEABODY INSTITUTE.

Though his estate is valued approximately at \$35 only, Charles Hammond, veteran English bootblack who died here recently, left a will in which, with the exception of 25 cents to many of several relatives in England, he devised and bequeathed all of his property to the Peabody Institute of New York, a charitable institution. Back of the will there is a story. The will was drawn in 1906 by City Recorder Thomas Fitz Gerald and was turned over by him today to V. Stroble, administrator. At the time of the making of the will, Hammond was under the impression that someone in England had left him considerable property. In some manner he developed a belief that a prominent Portland attorney and the British consul were conspiring to defraud him of his property and, knowing that the Peabody Institute was a wealthy corporation, made that institution his chief beneficiary, thinking it would undertake to secure the property by legal means.

SENATOR BELIEVES THERE ARE SPIES IN NAVY DEPARTMENT.

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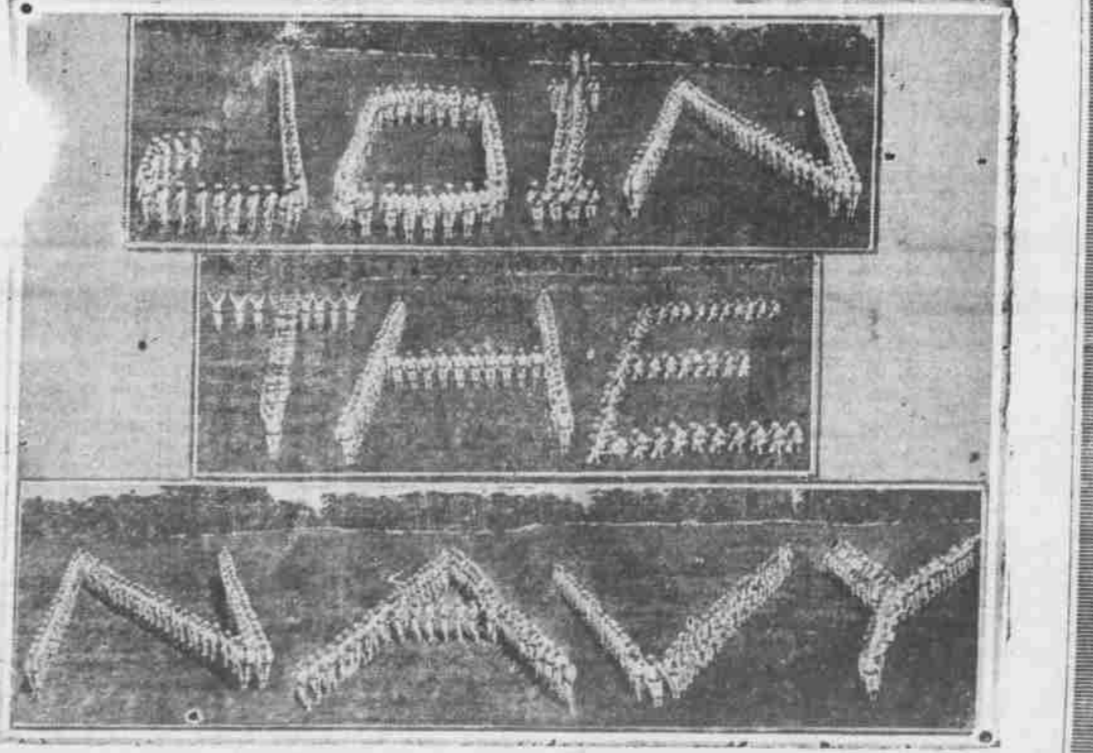
