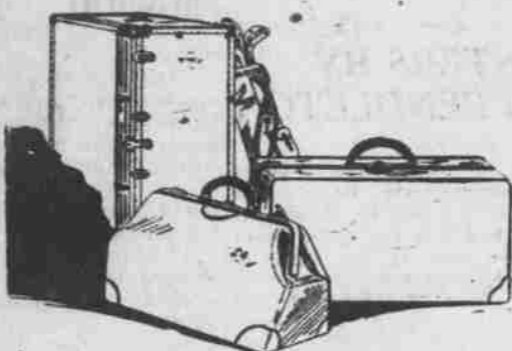

HOW TO ADDRESS MAIL OR WRITE TO SOLDIERS ABROAD

Location of Unit Must Not be Mentioned Even is Known to Writer.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Persons sending letters or cablegrams to American soldiers in France are cautioned in a war department announcement to include in the address only the name of the soldier, his company, regiment or other unit and the words "American Expeditionary Forces."

The location of the unit should not be mentioned, even if it be known.

The envelope should bear the name and address of the sender. Mail addressed care of the adjutant general of the army, Washington, will be forwarded only when the writer does not know that the addressee has actually embarked.

Similar rules prevail for communications from members of the expeditionary force to friends or relatives in the United States. Troop locations or movements must not be mentioned.

Money may be transmitted through postal orders, but arrangements have not yet been completed for parcel post service to the expeditionary force.

Private cablegrams to the soldiers should be addressed "Amexforce, London" with the addressee's name and unit appearing as the first words to the text.

To comply with European censorship regulations, all messages must be written in plain language (English or French) or in international code and must be intelligible to the censors. The use of two codes or two languages or of combinations of code and plain language in the same message is forbidden. Telegrams without text or with but one plain language text word are not admitted. Every telegram message must be signed. The surname alone may be used but such a signature as "John," "Mary" or "Mother" will NOT be passed.

CHANCE FOR SOME GIRL TO LOSE A HUSBAND

Bettens, Who is Going to War, Asks Mayor Mitchell to Find Him a Wife.

NEW YORK, July 17.—Here's a chance, girls.

William Bettens, thirty-five, Haskell, N. J., has written Mayor Mitchell asking that a wife be found for him. Bettens, who is English, but has his first citizenship papers, expects to go to war soon but promises in his letter:

"If my life is lost in this war my wife would inherit all my property. I have some cash in a bank in Brooklyn.

"I prefer," explains Bettens, "girls who have experience at housekeeping, and not those candy parlor, canary or white light beauties. I want a good, sensible American girl, age from 25 to 30, nice, attractive and good looking. She must have no objection to country life."

Bettens adds that his future spouse must be a "good plain cook" and, above all else, must not "run around with gossips."

PHILPS-STOKES QUIT THE SOCIALIST PARTY

NEW YORK, July 17.—J. O. Phelps Stokes and his wife, Russ Foster Stokes, announced last night their resignation from the Socialist party. They said they had "lost faith in the party as an effective instrument for advancing the Socialist cause." Approval by the party of a report disapproving the entrance of the United States into the war was given as the cause of the resignations.

They declare themselves sincere advocates of a just and lasting peace but realize that "international peace and good will cannot prevail while the sword of a modern Attila continues to ravage Europe and to threaten all mankind."

Which troops will move and which remain in armories has not been decided.

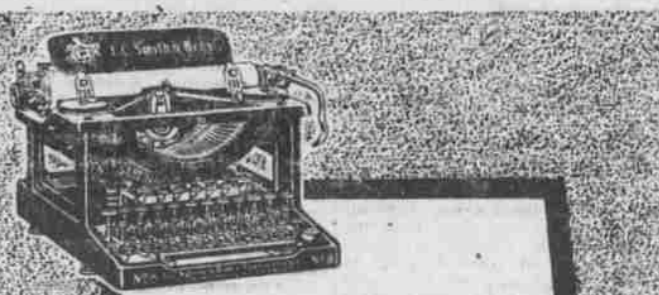

COAL OPERATORS WILL ASSIST GOVERNMENT

WASHINGTON, July 18.—A committee of coal operators late this afternoon met the coal production committee of the council of national defense and adopted a resolution by which each coal operator pledged to which the government supply of coal as it should require. Another resolution provided for the appointment of a committee, consisting of a delegate from each of the coal producing states, which will compile information regarding coal supplies and report the information obtained to the government. The committee will also devise some plan for coal distribution.

To Can Spring Beans.

(In the North and West.)
WASHINGTON, July 18.—Use fresh beans. String them. Blanch them from five to ten minutes in steam. Remove and dip quickly into and out of cold water. Pack directly into hot jars or cans. Pour in enough boiling water to fill the container. Add one level teaspoonful of salt to each quart. Put rubber rings

and caps on jars into position but do not tighten the wire clamps. Seal tin cans completely.

Place containers on a false bottom of wooden slats or wire mesh in a vessel of water deep enough to completely cover the containers. Keep the water boiling for three hours.

Remove the jars; tighten covers; invert jars to test sealing, and cool (not in draft as jars might crack). Tin cans may be placed in cold water for rapid cooling.

After the containers are cool, store in a dark, cool place.
