GOVERNMENT WINS NEW SLAV REVOLT

Second Russian Revolution Ended After Five Days of Rioting With Workmen; Soldiers' Council in Complete Domination; 7 Killed, 707 Wounded in Latest Fighting.

KERENSKY PUT AT HEAD OF RUSSIAN DEMOCRACY

LONDON, July 21.—Minister of War and Marine Kerensky has been temporarily named premier, succeeding Prince Lvoff, who has resigned, according to an announcement of the Petrograd Bourgeois Gazette. Kerensky, it is stated, has retained his place as military and naval chief.

ways Nekrasoff is temporarily filling the post of minister of justice.

PETROGRAD, July 20.—(Delayed)—One killed, 790 wounded of civilian soldier and sailor rioters, six Cosacks killed and 70 wounded in the casualty list of Russia's second revolution, apparently ended after five days of rioting, with the government in control.

The reorganization of the government has resulted from the revolution. The government is now in the hands of a central committee of the workmen's, and soldiers' congress

with provisional representatives acting as an administrative body responsible to the committee.

Lenine Completely Exposed. Affairs here are in immediate charge of General Polovtsov, chief of the army garrison, and M. Lebedev, Kerensky's naval assistant. The exposure of Nicholas Lenin, pacifist agitator, as a paid German agent helped to end the rebellion. Lenin artfully paraded a pseudo-patriotism and acquired a large following. The government didn't desire to arrest him, knowing he would pose as a martyr. The government investigated Lenin's record. Lieutenant Ermolenko, a Russian officer recently returned from a German prison, gave the government the desired evidence. Ermolenko swore that while a prisoner of the Germans they sent him back to Russia to assist for a separate peace. He was ordered, he swore to cooperate with Lenin and others.

The cabinet is now constituted in composed of six socialists and three members of other liberal parties. The domination of the workmen's, soldiers' council is complete.

COUR D'ALENE, July 21.—The town of Harrison, Idaho, with a population of 1000 is being wiped off the map by fire starting early this morning in the planing mill of the Grant Lumber company. The origin of the fire was not reported. The mill lies on the lake shore below the city. The flames climbed the hill to the city. The entire business district was burned and the residence section is now aflame. The damage is estimated at \$500,000.

NUMBERS AND NAMES OF DRAFT FOR SECOND ARMY

In the following list of names selected under the draft lottery is given the names of men who will not be subject to the first draft but in all probability will be in line for service under the second draft army. These names together with the names of those for the first draft make approximately 450 Umatilla county men in the order they will be called for service. At the second draft there will be no credits for enlistments, as for the first draft. Umatilla county's quota on a 7000 call from the state is estimated at 250. Figuring one half the men called will be exempt it would require 500 names to constitute this county's list for the second draft.

DRAFT LOTTERY COMPLETED IN WASHINGTON AT 2:08 A. M. MISSING NUMBER LOCATED

COMFORT KITS SENT TO FRANCE

DROWNED WHILE SWIMMING IN THE UMPQUA RIVER

ROBERTS, Ore., July 21.—(Special to the East Oregonian)—James Brown who was employed on a ranch near Clatskanie for the past few months was drowned in the Umpqua river there last Friday, when Brown failed to show up for work in the morning his employer went to investigate. The hat and shoes worn by Brown were found on the river bank. Two hours later the body was recovered from the river. Ranchers informed the coroner that Brown was seen swimming in the stream on the previous night. He was a sheep shearer and had spent much time in eastern Oregon. He was buried by the county here last Tuesday. Brown was an expert swimmer and it is presumed he was seized with cramps.

THREE SISTERS AMONG 15 PERSONS EXECUTED

LONDON, July 21.—The Echo de Paris is quoted in a Central News dispatch from Amsterdam in the effect that 58 persons were condemned to death at Antwerp and 15 of them were shot on July 5.

Among them, the newspaper says, were three sisters who were accused of smugging letters.
