RETURN FRENCH INVALIDS

Those Unable to Work Sent Back, 1000 Daily.

LONDON, July 21.—French men, women and children under 18 and more than 50 years of age are being returned by the Germans to France from the occupied sections in the north part of the country at the rate of 1000 a day, according to advices received by the Belgian relief commission here. The repatriation is being carried out through Switzerland.

Thousands of these refugees have arrived at Evian Les Bains in the department of Haute Savoie on Lake Geneva. Their condition is described as most pitiful. The relief commission and the American Red Cross may take measures to relieve them at Evian Les Bains, with no adequate accommodations for such throngs, is daily becoming more congested.

The refugees are all persons incapable of performing work useful to the Germans.

LIEUT. HOBBS WINS LAURELS.

Canadian Destroys Submarine and Zeppelin Single Handed.

HAMILTON, Ont., July 21.—Destruction, single handed, first of a German submarine and then of a Zeppelin by Lieutenant Basil D. Hobbs of the royal flying corps, is described in advices received today by his relatives.

His exploits, which have won him a letter of congratulation from Admiral Jellicoe and recommendation for the Victoria cross were accomplished in a zeppelin.

He swooped down over the U-boat and dropped bombs on it until it sank. A few days later he attacked the airship and sent it crashing to earth in flames, causing the death of its entire crew.

WILL BE USED FOR SOLDIERS.

Oregon Building at San Francisco Exposition to be Club Room.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21.—The Red Cross has at last received permission from the war department to convert the old Oregon building on the exposition site into a reading and club room for soldiers stationed at the Presidio.

At the close of the exposition the Oregon commission turned the big log building over to the war department, and since that time several efforts have been made to utilize it in some way, but until now the war department has failed to take any action in the matter.

HUSBAND IS HELD ON 'SLOW POISON' CHARGE

Wife Who Died After Strange Illness Bequeathed Estate of \$40,000 to an Aunt.

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 21.—Karl Lindberg who has been a resident here for only a few months, will have a preliminary hearing here Monday on a first degree murder charge, growing out of the recent death of his wife from what was pronounced "slow poisoning." Following her death in Wesley Hospital, County Attorney Selby caused an autopsy to be held by three physicians here, who reported the presence in the woman's stomach of arsenic.

The case had previously taken on considerable interest because of an unusual turn in the disposition of Mrs. Lindberg's estate, valued at about \$40,000, bequeathing her husband \$5 the remainder was left to an aunt, Mrs. Charlotte Steele of Clarion, Ia., who came here to attend her niece during her last illness.
