SILVERWARE THIEF CAUGHT IN PORTLAND  
Goods Stolen From Grip of Traveling Man at Hotel Pendleton Restored.  
The man who stole silverware from the grips of an M. Sellers & Co. traveling man at the Hotel Pendleton sample rooms early in July, has been apprehended in Portland and has restored the stolen goods. He gave the name of H. Arthur Ryecroft and claims to be a veteran of the Boer war. The Journal this morning tells of his arrest as follows:  
He was arrested on Friday, July 13, by Detectives Leonard and Snow and held for investigation. Saturday he confessed to having stolen at Pendleton several hundred dollars worth of silver and other articles from a sample trunk belonging to M. Sellers & Co. of Portland.  
The detectives told the man that if he would tell them where the stolen stuff was they would let him go, and Sunday he made good on the deal and turned over the stuff to the officers. He was thereupon released after having been housed and fed at the city's expense since the day of his arrest.

WANTS TO DARKEN APARTMENT HOUSES  
Federal Official Declares They Waste Coal in Lighting Up the Skies.  
WASHINGTON, July 22.—Van H. Manning, chief of the federal bureau of mines, gave out a statement today that fully \$500,000,000 was wasted last year through inefficient use of coal. He urged all Americans who employ power to learn how to get the full energy from coal.  
"And while discussing waste," he remarked, "allow me to say that the brilliant lighting of the roofs of apartment houses at night merely to make a pretty picture in the sky ought to be stopped during the period of the war. It is the most glaring example of waste of precious resources I have seen anywhere."

Postcards to Help Advertise Round-Up  
200,000 WILL BE DISTRIBUTED ALL OVER THE NORTHWEST: ASK FOR THEM.  
Today the real work of advertising the coming Round-Up, September 29, 21 and 22, started in earnest and long before the big exhibition is staged the dates will be advertised from one end of the continent to the other.  
The office force of the publicity department began work this morning and the plans of the board of directors include a wider and more extensive publicity campaign than ever before. The chief object of the management is to get the dates before the people, the show itself and the hospitality of Pendleton need no advertising. To accomplish this 200,000 beautiful post cards are being distributed all over the northwest and in fact all over the United States. Every merchant, business man, professional man and business house in Pendleton is being supplied with these post cards and they will go out in letters by the thousands. The O. W. R. & N. has asked for 10,000 of these post cards and the Oregon Journal has asked for 15,000 to supply the demand caused by its special train.  
To Use 50,000 Posters.  
Next week the work of distributing the big individual Round-Up posters will begin. Fifty thousand of these beautiful banners, showing Jackson Sundown winning the world's championship on Angel, will be used. Every newspaper, editor, will be issued a special invitation to visit Pendleton during the Round-Up and every state official of Oregon will be here, many of them having already signified their intention of coming.  
That the crowd will be as great if not greater than 1916 is practically assured. The special train arrangement to date, exact information concerning which will be announced later, includes a wider territory than ever before and if the number of special Pullman trains does not exceed any previous year it will be because the railroads cannot furnish the equipment and service, especially cooks and waiters. It may be that some of the special trains will come without dining car service and it will be up to the people of Pendleton to take care of them while here.
