SEVERE WEAKNESS IN CATTLE MART

PORTLAND, July 23.—Practically a record run of cattle in the North Portland yards on Monday forced one of the greatest price reactions known for an extended period on the local market during the week.

The run on Monday alone totaled 1911 head while totals for the week were 2129 head compared with 1464 head last week. A year ago there was still a greater run for the week than the present period with a total of 2522 head but at that time the market bid exactly like the present one.

Values not only showed severe losses on Monday but continued to weaken and decline during the remainder of the week when offerings were but moderate. There is not adestepping the situation in the cattle trade at this time. Too many cattle have been held back by deferred good weather and more has come forward in a bunch than usual. This coupled with the fact that killers are showing only a very limited amount of dressed beef business together with the overflowing of their feedlots, naturally causes a lack of appreciation for additional supplies.

Will Cause Shortage Later. While the immediate outlook for cattle marketing at North Portland and in fact all along the coast is not of a very favorable nature, still the situation so far as the future is concerned is highly profitable to shippers and feeders. Too much stock has been rushed upon the market of late and a very large per cent of it was not properly fed. This means that much stuff taken off feed should have been kept for a later period. That means a real shortage of cattle market offerings later when the supplies at the best are below current requirements.
