STANFIELD JOINS THE CANNING CLUB LISTS

Over 400 Pounds of Beans Have Been Canned in Past Two Weeks.

Stanfield entered the list of canning clubs of Umatilla county, recently and is going after its quota of canned beans or vegetables and fruit by canning twice a week. Over four hundred pounds of beans have been shipped from the Precinct district and canned in Stanfield in the past

two weeks, says E. W. Montell county club leader. The canning club of Stanfield began last week to do their share in the food conservation campaign by canning over a hundred quarts of green beans. The girls of the club have decided to go after the work with a will and have made arrangements to can twice a week. NAVAL GUNNERS BATTLE U-BOAT WITH FLAMES RAGING ABOUT THEM

The secretary of the navy has made public the following report of the chief petty officer in charge of the armed guard of the steamship Moresni: "The Chief of Naval Operations, via Commandant, Navy Yard, New York 'Subject: Vagans report of steamship Moresni, bound for Savona, Italy, via Sanmost, Tex., and Gibraltar. 'The steamship Moresni sailed from New York on May 1, 1917. Here sighted before leaving the harbor. 'May 10th held target practice. Fired 10 shots from each gun. Every thing was in good condition. 'Arrived at Beaumont, Tex., on May 14, 1917, for Gibraltar, Spain. 'On May 21, 1917, picked up motor boat from the schooner Omega Empress, with four men on board. 'Arrived at Gibraltar on June 7, 1917. 'Sailed from Gibraltar on June 7, 1917. 'About 1 a. m. June 12, the engine stopped. I was awakened and asked the captain what was the trouble. He said something was wrong in engine room and engine had to be stopped. They remained stopped for about three-quarters of an hour. 'Attacked by U-boat. 'We were attacked by a submarine at 4:05 a. m. on June 12, 1917. She was off port quarter, about 900 yards away. She fired four or five shots before we located her. We swung around until our stern faced the submarine and returned the fire at range of about 700 yards. Submarine stayed about half an hour and then disappeared for that reason our shots fell short. We sent out a radio call for assistance. 'After a half-hour fight we were hit in the gasoline tank aft, and a fire started. It was reported to me that the ammunition aft was running low. Immediately I lined up the forward gun's crew with the merchant crew to pass ammunition from forward to aft. About an hour later fire broke out all over the ship and it became impossible for the men to pass any more ammunition aft. When I saw such was the case I happened to be aft the mainmast and I called for one of the gun's crew to go forward with me. I reached the bridge being burned on the way; the man was unable to follow. About this time steering gear was shot away and we started to go around in circles. 'Orders Gunners from Lifeboat. 'Coming down off the bridge, I saw the captain and the boatwain. Who was holding the falls tends to lower the lifeboat. The captain said to come and get in the lifeboat, as it was starting to burn. I told him to wait. He said he would hold the boat as long as possible for me. 'I then noticed two of the gun's crew in the lifeboat. I ordered them to get out and come with me. We went forward and manned the forward gun, with which we fired four shots before the firing pin went out of commission. 'When the submarine saw our fire was coming closer she steamed full speed astern, so that we could not see her. Then as we could fire no more and as the captain called that the lifeboat was burning we got into the boat. 'Ship Going in Circles. 'Meanwhile the engines of the ship had not been stopped and she was going around in circles, which she continued to do for about a half hour after we left. 'The lifeboat upset when it hit the water, and two of the merchant crew were lost. We swam around until we were able to get the capsized boat, turn it over and climb into it. 'I found out afterward that soon after I went forward, during the fight, the after gun's crew and merchant crew left in their boat as fire was becoming too hot and would have burned the boat. I also found out that the first mate of the ship left much earlier, before any of the other boats with three men, leaving behind the men who were supposed to go in that boat. 'Praised by U-boat Crew. 'The submarine called the boat's alongside and congratulated us, shook hands with the captain and told us that it was the best fight they had ever seen any merchantman put up. He asked if there were any Englishmen in the boat. I told him no. 'The Germans treated two men who had been wounded and returned to the other boats. The commander of the submarine said he would tow us toward the beach but for the fact that we had called for assistance. 'The submarine then left us, and commenced firing again into the Moresni, she finally hit the Moresni's engine room, which stopped the engines. We then lost sight of the submarine. 'About an hour after the submarine left us, we were picked up by the Spanish steamer, Valbanera (about 8 a. m. June 13, 1917), who had received our call for assistance. The captain of Valbanera told me we were then about 17 miles off Cape de Palos, Spain. 'Cheers from Submarine. 'Shortly after submarine came up near Valbanera. Officer of ship got in small boat and went over to submarine. He returned to ship and submarine went round the ship, submarine crew cheering and Valbanera's crew also cheering, and then steamed away. 'While on the Valbanera we were given every consideration; dry clothing, good food, and good sleeping accommodations. 'We were landed in Barcelona Spain at 8 a. m. June 15, 1917. Reported to the American consul on arriving, who

INTIMIDATORS QUIT ON SEEING U. S. GUNS Italians, Who Tried to Coerce Negro Workmen, Huddled Out of Camp by Regular Soldiers.

BALTIMORE, July 22—More than thirty Italian laborers who tried to chase a group of negro workmen from Camp Meade, the National Army encampment at Annapolis, Md., were themselves ousted by a detachment on guard there, just on board a Baltimore and Ohio train bound for this city and told if they ever came back they would be severely dealt with.

The deportation was supervised by Major Proctor, U. S. A., who is in charge of building the encampment. So quickly was it carried out that the Italians did not have a chance to retaliate. They looked at the soldiers and at the guns and boarded a train. Major Proctor learned that the Italians, who were helping to lay tracks for the Baltimore and Ohio, had landed together, and had told the negro workmen they would have to get out of the camp. The Italians feared the negroes would work for less money. When the Italians became menacing their foreman notified Major Proctor. A squad of regulars escorted the men to the station.
