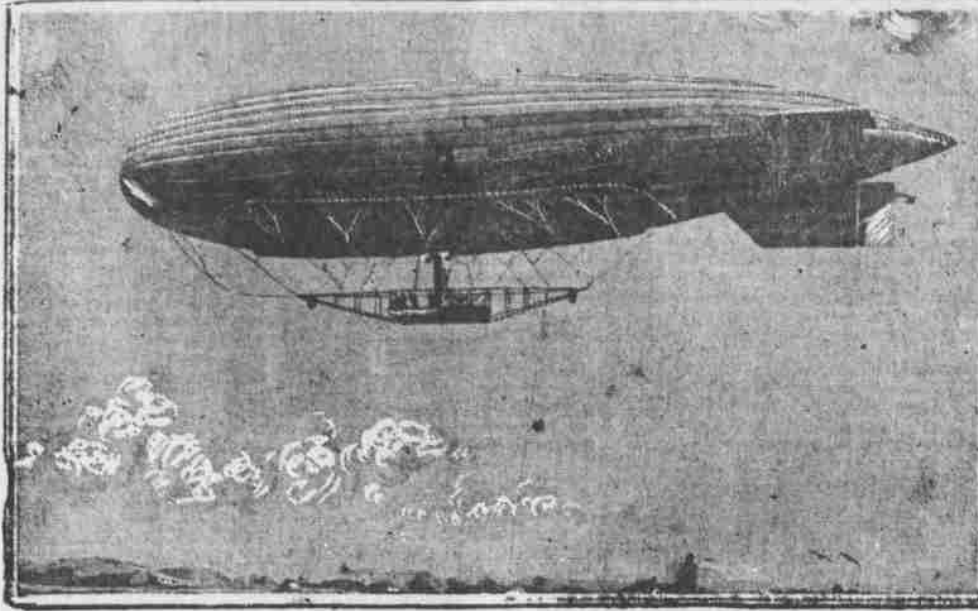

10 YEAR OLD BOY IS DROWNED IN COLUMBIA

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 13.—Ten-year-old Victor Monneau, of 493 Davis street, was drowned in one of the sloughs tributary to the Columbia river near Columbia Beach shortly after noon yesterday.

Thad, together with several other boys, was swimming and it is thought ventured too far into the stream. The boy screamed for help and W. A. Snedeker, of 833 East Sixty-seventh street, North, who was fishing from a boat near by, sounded the alarm, being unable to swim himself.

A long pole was used and the body was recovered in a short time, but not until it was too late for resuscitation with a pulmotor.

The boy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. V. J. Monneau, reside at 493 Davis street. Coroner Smith took charge of the body.

It was asserted by Mr. Smith last night that there is no life-saving equipment in use at the beach, and it was necessary to carry the pulmotor from Portland to the scene.

MILLION A DAY IN FARM LOANS ASKED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Applications for farm loans are pouring into the federal land banks at the rate of more than \$1,000,000 a day, the federal farm loan board announced yesterday, the total for July having reached \$34,319,000. During that month the board approved loans amounting to \$15,000,000.

About \$4,000,000 has been loaned farmers thus far.

WILL SEE ECLIPSE OF SUN FROM BAKER POINT

BAKER, Ore., Aug. 13.—Professor S. D. Townley, astronomer-instructor at Stanford university, arrived here Thursday to make arrangements to bring a party here next June to observe the total eclipse of the sun. Baker offers the best vantage point for observations. Professor Townley says hundreds of astronomers will be here and that the total eclipse will last one minute and 52 seconds.

ALLIES WANT OUR U-BOAT CHASERS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Intimations came from diplomatic quarters today that naval experts of the allies probably would undertake to demonstrate to the American navy department the wisdom of continuing on an extensive scale the building of submarine chasers.

Operations near shore of fleet little craft such as the 110-footers that today that naval experts of the allies have been most successful in the war zone, and the navy department's policy of limiting the output of chasers here is not looked upon with favor by the allied sea strategists.

Contracts for many hundreds of chasers have been built, but it was explained at the department today that the type of boat was adopted chiefly for river and harbor and inshore patrol work along the coasts.

LAND BOARD HAS LOANED \$300,000

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 13.—Up to the first of this month the state land board had loaned from the state's rural credits fund the sum of \$321,850, and had remaining on hand available for loaning \$73,239.

One hundred and ninety-five loans have been made from the fund, and many more could have been made if the money had been available. The money was not available because the land board could not sell the rural credit bonds, bearing 4 per cent interest, at par. The board issued \$450,000 of bonds, but all of them have not been sold.

Early Rush Ceases.

When the funds were first available there was a rush of applications for loans. This ceased when the funds became limited and the board allotted each county only \$600 for loans.

The counties of Harney, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, Multnomah, Tillamook, Union, Wheeler and Yamhill have either completely or almost used up their allotted portions.
