No Fires in Forest.

The smoky atmosphere in Pendleton this morning led many to the belief that there are forest fires in this vicinity but Supervisor Cryder of the Umatilla forest states that he has no report of any fires. He thinks the smoke was probably blown from the sound regions where fires are burning.

Applicants Get Notifications.

The successful Umatilla county applicants for admission to the second officers' reserve corps all received their official notification of their selection during the weekend. They are notified to present themselves at the camp on August 25. They are required to take a pledge to accept any commission which might be offered them at the close of the training period.

Local Boys in Naval Films.

When the films showing naval life were shown at the Pastime theater Saturday evening many of the audience recognized in the pictures Wesley Mims and the Mims boys of Pendleton, who are now serving in the navy. The films did not reach here until Saturday evening and, on that account, were left over today by Chief Gunner's Mate Phoenix who has them in charge. They will be shown at the theater today in connection with the regular program and without added cost. On next Saturday the navy will send a real torpedo here and it will be demonstrated in front of the Alta theater.

CAN GET ALL MEN FROM FIRST DRAFT

It is not at all beyond the pale of probability that the 43 men required of Umatilla county on the first draft will be secured from the first list of 86 drawn, judging from the way the exemption boards are tightening up. Today the board certified 21 men to the district board at La Grande and this without passing upon any claims for exemption.

This does not necessarily mean that these 21 will be turned over to the national army. After today these men will have five days in which to file claims for exemption on occupational grounds and some of them will undoubtedly do so.

Another Discharged.

The list above is practically the same as the unofficial list published Saturday in the East Oregonian. Three other names were included in that list. Lawrence George Collins of this city, however, will probably be discharged for physical disability. He was passed originally but a re-examination today showed a defect that will bar him from service. Edward Ledke will not be certified to until the board investigators to ascertain whether he is a Russian or a German. Edward Euton, Jr., of Umatilla has failed to report and, while the chances are against him being exempted, the board cannot pass upon him until he is found.

The board today received a report on one of the five men of the county examined by other boards. Gilman Guy Young was passed by the examining physician at The Dalles but he has a claim of exemption on file here.

The board will not hurry in deciding upon the claims for exemption inasmuch as the duty is a serious one. Each case will be carefully weighed before a decision is reached. However it seems very probable to predict that not a few of the claims will be rejected, the regulations of the government forcing local boards to draw tight lines in deciding questions of dependency.

ONE WEEK TO MAKE FOREST INTO CAMP

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—More than 12,000 carloads of lumber and other building supplies for the sixteen National Army cantonments to house the first division of men called to the colors, have been delivered by the railroads within thirty days from the placing of the first order.

An indication of the speed with which the materials are being delivered was cited today in an announcement from the railroads war board telling of the erection of administration buildings at the cantonments at Louisville, Ky., from lumber cut in a Mississippi pine forest the week before. The trees were felled on Saturday, kiln dried on Sunday, loaded on freight cars Monday and delivered at the cantonment site on Wednesday. Carpenters completed the transformation from forest to government buildings just one week from the day the trees had been felled.
