**W. B. AYER NAMED AS OREGON FOOD MAN**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—Appointment of 28 men as federal food commissioners in 19 many states was approved today by President Wilson. Commissioners for the other states will be selected by the food administration within a few days. The state commissioners will administer the food control bill insofar as it applies to state matters, and will co-ordinate state food activities with those of the federal administration. All of the men will serve without pay.

Among the commissioners announced today are:

California, Ralph P. Merritt, San Francisco; Montana, Professor Alfred Atkinson, Bozeman; Oregon, W. B. Ayer, Portland; Washington, Charles Heberd, Spokane; Wyoming, Theodore C. Diers, Sheridan.

**EXEMPTION REFUSED SECRET SERVICE MAN**

Board at Seattle Declines to Follow Recommendation of McAdoo; Man in Question Did Not Ask Exemption.

SEATTLE, Aug. 17.—Despite the fact that W. G. McAdoo, secretary of the treasury, personally recommended that local board No. 7 here, of the selective draft officials, grant exemption to Archie Strange, secret service agent, that board Wednesday stood firm in its refusal to comply with McAdoo's recommendation.

Strange did not ask for exemption himself, but Captain Thomas R. Foster, head of the secret service, and W. H. Moran, acting chief of the secret service division of the treasury at Washington, submitted affidavits requesting Strange's discharge.

"If there is going to be any granting of exemptions due to favoritism in high authority it will not be with my consent," said Mr. Kennedy.

NEPHEW OF HINDENBURG OFFERS U. S. PLAN TO FIGHT U-BOATS.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Aug. 18.—Paul Francis Schlick, nephew of General von Hindenburg and Yale graduate, has just placed at the disposal of the United States government a new device for fighting submarines.
