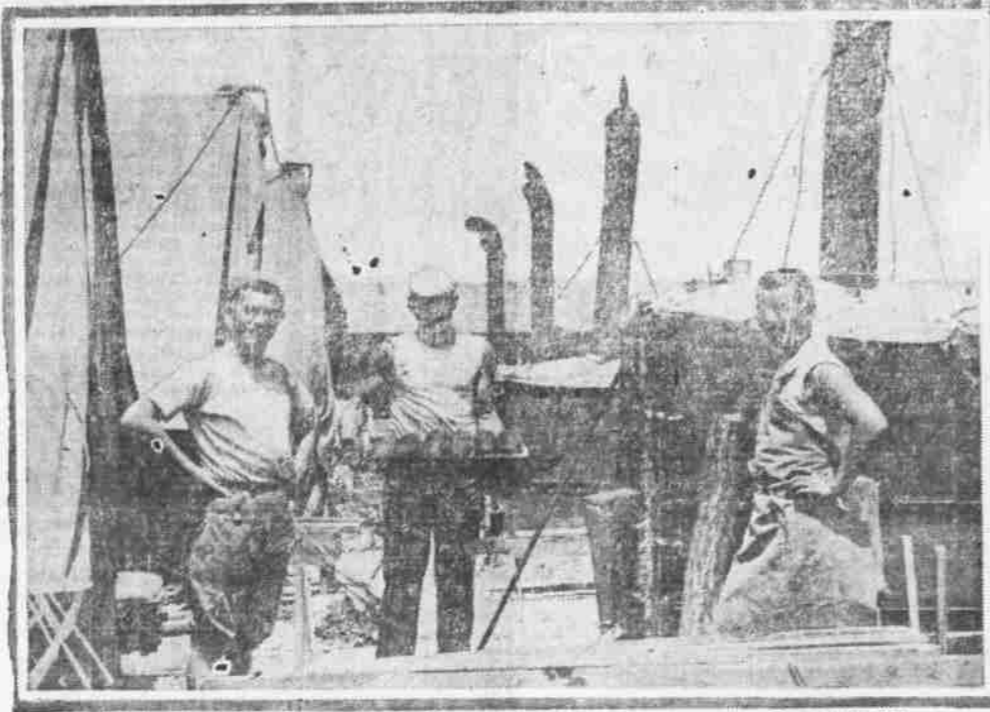

Hog market was the sensational feature with sales early in the day at \$18, or \$1 above the extreme top previously reached, while a few moments later a load went at \$18.25, a sheer advance of \$1.25.

Record prices mean little or nothing in the swine trade here at this time, one day's high records for swine being the next day's low figures.

Only a small run of good killer hogs was shown in the yards at the opening of the day's trading, but quite a fair lot of feeders came forward. Demand for these was naturally keen on account of the sharp rise in killers.

Good cattle sold well around \$8.75 for tops early in the trading in the steer division but the cow market was firmer and higher with a sale of a load sent in by H. R. Dunham from Redmond. These sold at \$7.35 right at the start.

Market for cattle was overcrowded with poor quality stuff, most of the receipts consisting of common Jerseys and were in poor shape. While these did not bring high prices, they sold well in proportion to their actual worth.
