### Adding on to Chop Mill.

### WOULD MODIFY STEEL EMBARGO

Japanese Ship Builders Say It Would Hurt Industry.

TOKYO, Aug. 21.—Japanese ship builders have inaugurated a national movement to seek a modification of the steel embargo and have formed a league for the purpose of bringing about a cancellation of the American embargo on iron and steel.

The shipbuilders have presented lengthy memorials to the Japanese government and to George Post Wheeler, the American charge at Tokio urging relief from the embargo, claiming that it would ruin the ship building industry, close factories and bring about a discontinuance of the construction of ships either building or contracted for by the entente powers.

### PICKETING MUST BE STOPPED.

Washington Police Arrest Women Near White House.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Formal notice was served by the police today upon the leaders of the woman's party that recalled picketing of the White House would be tolerated no longer, and in future banner bearers would be arrested as fast as they appeared. Several hours were allowed for the warning to take effect. Then six women posted at the executive mansion were carried off in a patrol wagon. All gave bond for appearance tomorrow to answer charges of obstructing traffic.

### CONTINUE WAREHOUSE LICENSE

Tri-State Terminal Company Fined, No Fraud.

OLYMPIA, Aug. 21.—M. H. Houser of Portland has failed in his effort to have the public service commission cancel the licenses of the Tri-State Terminal Warehouse company, which operates a string of warehouse houses in eastern Washington. Houser complained that the company had failed to store a crop of grain he had sacked and specially piled as ordered.

When he demanded a wheat it was missing. The company claimed a mistake had been made and offered to give him bushel for bushel of wheat of equal grade and quality. Houser insisted the licenses be cancelled. After hearing the testimony and finding that an error had been made, fraud not being established the commission has dismissed the complaint. But it has directed certain reforms be installed so that it will not happen again.

### JEWES MAY LEAVE PALESTINE.

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 21.—Ira Nelson Morris, the American minister, advised today that he had received official advice from Turkey that about 700 American Jews had been granted permission to leave Palestine for the United States. Mr. Morris said that nearly 100 already had left Constantinople for Switzerland. These 700 Jews represent about one-half of the American colony in Palestine.

### SEAMEN WANT GERMANS DEBARRED FROM VESSELS

Would Forever Rule Them Off the British Ships, Claiming They Are Infidels.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—At today's session of the convention of seamen representing several entente and neutral countries it was proposed that Germans be debarrd forever from sailing on British ships.

The Germans were denounced for ignoring the laws of the sea and refusing to succor those in peril. The seamen declared they were still unwilling to carry socialism to the international Stockholm conference, but were awaiting the time when they could carry delegates from victorious allied armies on the way to Berlin.

### MICHAEL PREFERS RUSSIA TO ENGLAND

Grand Duke Does Not Take Kindly to Invitation to Change Residence.

PETROGRAD, Aug. 21.—Grand Duke Michael, according to the Bourse

Gazette has rejected the suggestion that he go to England to live, declaring he could not leave Russia until the constituent assembly has determined the future form of government.

It will be remembered that Grand Duke Michael made at the beginning of the revolution a provisional renunciation of his claim to imperial succession declaring he will only accept the throne if called by the people.

The Bourse Gazette says there were persistent reminders a few days before the transfer of ex-Empress Nicholas from Paterkof-Selo that Grand Duke Michael had departed for England. Investigation proved he had been given the option of going there but refused to do so until the question of regime was settled.
