HERMISTON, Aug. 24.—J. C. Barham, well known project farmer, died Monday evening at his home after a lingering illness from tuberculosis. Funeral services were conducted yesterday from the home with Rev. T. A. Graham of the Methodist church officiating, and burial was in the Hermiston cemetery. The pallbearers were P. A. Brunson, Paul Miller, C. A. Kellar and Leo Clark. Mr. Barham was born in Erie, Penn., January 29th, 1863. He held the position of receiving clerk for the Griswold Manufacturing Company of Erie for 23 years and came here from that city seven years ago. He is survived by his wife and son and two sisters, Miss Emma Barham, who was with him at his death, and Mrs. George Ludwig of Erie, Penn.
