District Exemption Board Receives Word to Make Draft Conform With President's Ideas Relative to "Heads of Families"

ALL DEPENDENCY CASES ARE TO BE RECONSIDERED

LA GRANDE, Ore., Aug. 29.—(Special to East Oregonian)—The draft lists certified by the district exemption board of eastern Oregon to the adjutant general will be revised in conformance with the recent ideas expressed by President Wilson relative to "heads of families."

CALLS THE MASSES ANTI-WAR LEADER

Burleson Says Socialist Magazine Clearly Violates the Espionage Law.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—The Masses, a Socialist magazine published in New York, was denounced by Postmaster General Burleson in a communication to the senate today, as a leader in organized propaganda to discourage enlistments, prevent subscriptions to the Liberty Loan and obstruct the draft act.

Mr. Burleson declined to give more specific reasons for having the Masses removed from the mails, saying such information was incompatible with the public interest.

From matter received by this department from various sections of the country, I find there is an organized propaganda to discredit and handicap in every way the government in the prosecution of this war with the clear and unmistakable purpose of defeating the objects for which the government is spending millions of dollars, and probably will be called upon to sacrifice thousands of lives.
