

NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Pendleton, held on August 30th, 1917, the following resolutions were duly adopted:

Whereas, the City Surveyor of the City of Pendleton did on the day of August, 1917, under direction and by requirement of the Common Council, file in the office of the Recorder of the City of Pendleton, plans and specifications for an improvement of the following streets in said city, to-wit: Jackson Street, from the East line of Main Street to the East curb line of Monroe Street; Monroe Street, from the North line of Jackson Street to the North line of Clinton Street; and Washington Street, from the East line of Main Street to the West line of Monroe Street, together with estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement and the percentage of the total cost of improvement, which such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement, and

Whereas, the council has examined such plans and specifications and estimates and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefor to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work, and

Whereas, the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited by the improvement, and no property is excluded therefrom, which should properly be included therein, and

Resolved, that the engineer's estimates of the probable total cost of such improvement, which said Engineer's estimates were made and prepared by George Kimbrell, City Surveyor, and filed with the Recorder of said city on the day of August, 1917, and are hereby adopted and approved, and be it further

Resolved, that the plans and specifications for such improvement, as prepared by the City Surveyor, and filed with the Recorder of the City of Pendleton on the day of August, 1917, and are hereby adopted and approved, and be it further

Resolved, that the cost of making such improvement shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvements and the owners of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land, so specially benefited by such improvements shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof, and be it further

Resolved, that an assessment district is hereby created to be known as Assessment District No. 28, embracing the property benefited and to be assessed for the payment of such improvement, which assessment district shall include all lots, parts of lots and parcels of lands lying within the district bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

COMMENCING at the Southeast corner of Lot 10, Block 2, Switzer's Add. Thence North 100 feet to the Northwest corner of Lot 12, Block 13, Livermore's Add. Thence West 200 feet to the Northwest corner of Lot 13, Block 13, Livermore's Add. Thence South 510 feet to the Southwest corner of Lot 3, Block 4, Switzer's Add. Thence East 200 feet to the place of beginning.

And be it further Resolved, that a copy of this resolution, together with the estimate of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land is on file in the office of the City Recorder for a period of ten days in the East Oregonian, which newspaper is hereby designated by the Common Council for the publication thereof.

And notice is further given that the Surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land within the assessment district, as said resolution hereunto, is on file in the office of the City Recorder of the City of Pendleton.

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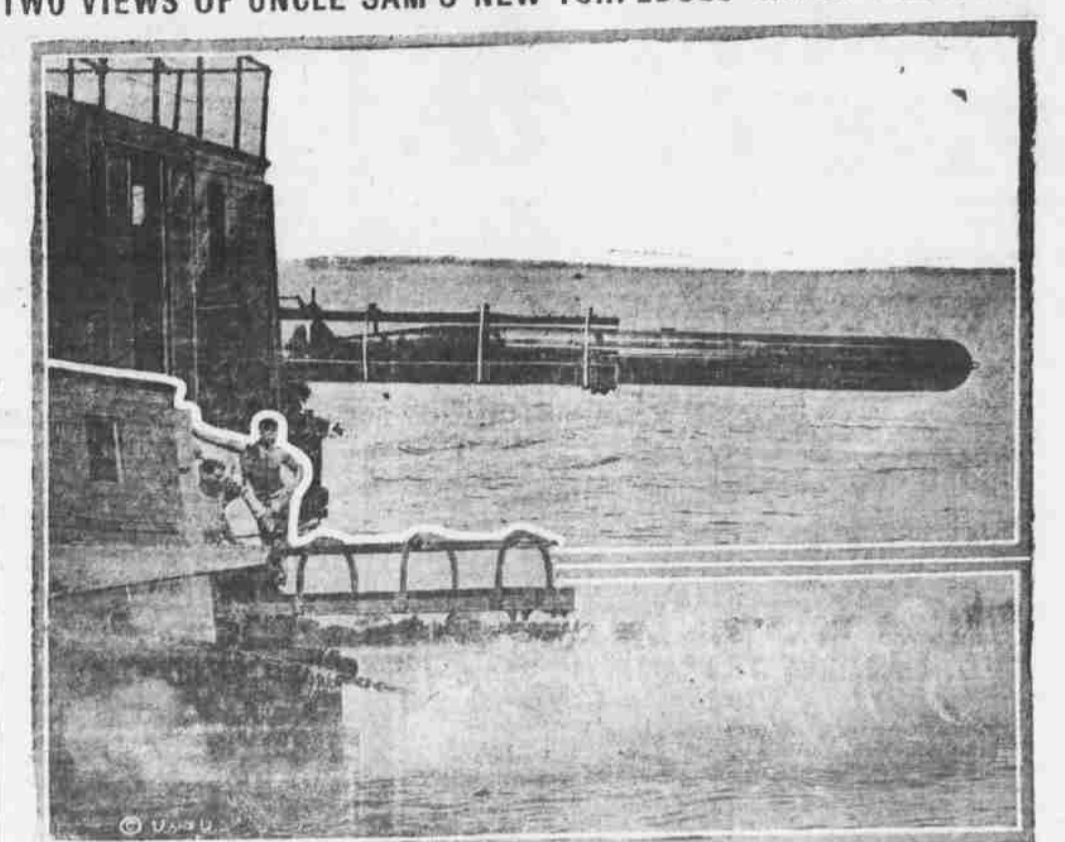
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TWO VIEWS OF UNCLE SAM'S NEW TORPEDOES READY FOR U-BOATS



The upper photograph shows a tub containing a torpedo just leaving the tub at the testing grounds at Sag Harbor, N. Y. The lower picture shows the splash of the torpedo after it struck the water. Each torpedo is tested in this way. It is shot into the water and followed by a submarine chaser to be picked up when it has spent its force. If the torpedo runs true to form it is accepted by the government, and it is believed, sent on its way to the North Sea, there for use against German submarines.
