LIVE NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 4.—Canadians today are asked to be patriotic when they eat. Under recently enacted orders in council, restaurants under penalty of prosecution are compelled to display prominently signs asking patrons to practice economy when ordering food.

"All persons in ordering their food ought to consider the needs of Great Britain and her allies and their supplies for wheat, beef and bacon and the food controller requires the public to do everything in their power to make these commodities available for export by eating as little as possible of them and by making use of substitutes and avoiding waste."

Beef and bacon must not be served on Tuesdays and Fridays and where white bread is served, some substitute is to be made available.

Port Authorities Convene. PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 4.—Twenty-five port authorities from Victoria, B. C., to Los Angeles, met here today at the annual convention of the Pacific Coast Association of Port Authorities. The convention ends tomorrow night.

A discussion of shipping after the war, and of war-time commerce was one of the features of today's program. Mayor George Baker formally welcomed the visiting officials and Charles B. Moore, chairman of the Port of Portland and president of the association responded.

Teaching Fruit Packing. CORVALLIS, Ore., Sept. 4.—Teaching the best methods in handling and packing pears and apples, a fruit packing school—practically free to northwest fruit growers—opened at the Oregon Agricultural college here today. Packing, grading, ear-loading and the use of storage houses are being taught. Modern machinery is being demonstrated to the fruitmen.

"We are facing one of the shortest fruit crops in the history of the country," said E. J. Lewis, chief of the horticultural division of the college today in explaining the purpose of the school. "A decrease of 12 per cent in the apple crop will create a big demand for apples. There was never before in Oregon so great a need for correct and careful handling of fruit."

Character Keeps Him Out. PORT ANGELES, Wash., Sept. 4.—M. E. Ritsenthaler's character will keep him out of the military service. He says so himself. Ritsenthaler's exemption claim is believed to be the most unique one filed in this state.

Ritsenthaler says he has a dishonorable discharge from the army and that his character hasn't improved since it was given him. He tried to enlist earlier in the war, he says, but recruiting officers refused to accept him. Ritsenthaler, however, says he is willing to go before a local board for examination.

Five Wells at Camp. CAMP LEWIS, American Lake, Wash., Sept. 4.—Five wells that will tap a stream of pure underground water are being completed today. They supply the cantonment camp here with water.

The territory forming the watershed for the springs has been made a reserve and trespassing is forbidden. Water will play an important part in the life of the soldier in the making. Between 600 and 700 washbowls and 2,000 shower baths are being installed.

CANADA WILL FLOAT 4TH WAR LOAN IN OCTOBER

OTTAWA, Sept. 1.—The fourth war loan of one hundred or one hundred and fifty million will probably be floated in October. Representatives of the Canadian bond dealers association and Sir Thomas White discussed the terms. The distinction has already floated three loans aggregating three hundred and fifty million.

WOMEN OF STATE TO REGISTER ON SEPTEMBER 15TH

HOOD RIVER, Sept. 4.—The Woman's Committee of the Oregon Council of Defense, through its chairman, Mrs. Charles H. Castner of Hood River, has designated Saturday September 15th as official registration day for the women of this state.

The registration is wholly voluntary and is for the purpose of the federal government becoming familiar with the woman power of the state—listing all girls and women, both trained and untrained, for work in the government service in some capacity, should it be found necessary for the nation to call upon the women of the country to take the places of men in industry in order that men may be released to join the colors. It is also essential so that trained female help may be secured for government positions and positions directly connected with military affairs that can be filled by women.

Must Fill Out Cards. A properly printed card is to be filled out by every woman and on the day of registration all assistance will be rendered in filling the card. Local committees have been formed in nearly all localities of the state for the purpose of caring for this work on September 15th and Governor Withycombe, appreciating the importance of this undertaking, has issued the following proclamation:

Whereas, Executive Department, Salem, Sept. 1, 1917. Whereas, the women of America, as well as the men who are giving themselves to our nation's cause, can now perform a great and timely public service; and Whereas, the Woman's Committee of the Council of National Defense is organizing local councils in every community in this state with the purpose of systematizing and making effective women's patriotic services; and Whereas, the Oregon Division of the Woman's Committee of the Council of National Defense desires that Saturday, September 15, 1917, be set aside as the day for the registration of women in this state for service;

Now, therefore, in view of the foregoing premises and by virtue of the authority in me vested, I, James Withycombe, governor of the state of Oregon, do hereby proclaim Saturday, September 15, 1917, as Women's Registration Day, and I do earnestly ask that all patriotic women register on that day for patriotic service.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the State of Oregon to be hereunto affixed this 1st day of September, A. D. 1917.

RECRUIT MANY BRITONS HERE. CHICAGO, Sept. 3.—Colonel John S. Dennis, commanding the western division of the British recruiting station, said today that sufficient Canadians and Britons had been enlisted since the recruiting of England's subjects in the United States began to make more than six full battalions, and that work now under way was augmenting the number at the rate of 300 a week.

ASK LENDERS TO BE EASY. Drafted Men Have Fears of Mortgage Foreclosure. HELENA, Mont., Sept. 3.—The district appeal board of Division No. 1, today passed a resolution declaring that "it is the sense of the board based upon its knowledge of claims made for exemption because of agricultural industry that the banker and money lenders generally to whom such claimants are indebted shall be as lenient as possible in settlement with such persons when they are certified to army service under the selective draft. It is believed that the profits made by bankers or money lenders in consequence of the certification of such men called to the ar-

my service is most reprehensible, un-American and unpatriotic."

It is said the board has learned that the fear of foreclosure on farms property has influenced large numbers of farmers in asking exemption.

JAPANESE SEE NAVY AID. WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—Vice Admiral Takoshta, Major General Suzano and other naval and military members of the imperial Japanese mission were escorted through the Washington navy yard today. They were much interested in the guns under construction and in the relics of past wars. Viscount Ishii will address the senate and Ambassador Satow will give a reception tomorrow evening.
