To Build Garage.

Captain Drake of the Pendleton Reserves has issued a call for a meeting to be held at Happy Canyon tomorrow evening to consider the matter of renewing drill and other matters requiring immediate attention. All members and those who contemplate joining are urged to attend.

Boy Legs No Barrier Here.

L. P. "Doc" Shackle of Stanfield has found a berth for the war. He was one of the recruits taken down to Clackamas by Lieutenant Spell last week. He had enlisted in the navy and was rejected because he had slightly bowed legs. His defect was not considered sufficient to keep him out of the cavalry troop.

British Captain Coming.

Captain Carter, recruiting officer for the British army who is now stationed in Portland, is coming to Pendleton for the Round-Up and will probably arrive several days ahead of the show. He will make an effort to enlist British subjects in these parts. President Tyman of the Commerce association has appointed C. E. Roosevelt, Secretary C. K. Cranston and John Vorr as a committee to assist him in getting established.

Land Office Is Open.

Representing the Montana-Western Lands Co., A. D. Bulman, Pendleton manager, has opened offices in the Main street room of the East Oregonian building. His company owns 200,000 acres of Montana land, lying south of the Alberta wheat belt and weekly trips are to be made to Montana a special rate by rail being in vogue until October 31. The company sells its own land.

Transferred to Troop D.

Vernie Boynton, former Pendleton druggist who enlisted some months ago in the hospital corps of the army and who recently received a sergeant's pay, has been transferred to Troop D as hospital sergeant and will have charge of six privates transferred with him. Among the privates are Jess Stranahan who formerly played ball here. Sergeant Boynton in a letter to his father declares he is "the luckiest guy in the world" at being transferred to the Pendleton cavalry bunch. He has come to Charlotte, N. C. with the troop.

Nap Lynch Beats Drumheller.

Allan Drumheller, winner of the cowboys' relay race at the past two Round-Ups, was defeated last week at the Spokane fair in a six day race by Nap Lynch, also a Round-Up rider and who will be here next week. Their final race Saturday was a dead heat but Lynch's time for the six days was about 13 seconds better than Drumheller. Darrel Cannon, riding Barney Sherry's string, was third and Susata Jim, an Indian, fourth. Mabel DeLong, riding Drumheller's string, easily won the women's relay over Mrs. Parsons and Josephine Sherry.
