**ARE YOU DOING THIS?**

WITH most every household taking extra steps this year to store food for use during the winter it is of interest to know the normal requirements of the average home. Some information on the subject is given in the last weekly news letter by the department of agriculture.

A family of five, including two adults and three children under 12 years of age, under ordinary living conditions, should have stored for each month of the winter season the following food supplies: 1 bushel of Irish potatoes; 1/2 bushel of other root vegetables such as carrots, turnips, and parsnips; 25 quart cans of other vegetables, and 20 quarts of canned fruit and preserves. These figures are based on estimates by the United States Department of Agriculture, which adds that most of this should come from the perishable products of the many home gardens of this year.

With these figures as a basis, it is thought that almost any family may calculate its requirements, taking into consideration the length of the winter season in any given locality. Thus, in the South, where

food crops may be grown in the fall, the winter allowance may be less than for the far North, where one must count on supplies for several months longer.

And the meeting closed with the most melancholy hymn in the book. I feel as if I never want to go to prayer meeting again."
