Kansas Cantonment Will Be Largest for Training National Army. RAISING QUEBEC BRIDGE SPAN

QUEBEC, Sept. 21.—The huge central span of the Quebec cantilever bridge tonight is 80 feet from the position it is to occupy over the St. Lawrence river, the 5000-ton mass of metal having been raised 42 feet during the day. Those in charge estimate that the span will be trussed into place between the cantilevers not later than Thursday noon.

The span now is well above the point from which another span broke from its mooring and killed 13 persons in its plunge into the river in 1916.
