GERMANY STRAINS AT LOAN.

Failure Will Encourage England to Go On Fighting, Public Told.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 21.—Germany's seventh war loan campaign is in full blast. Subscriptions to the loan opened at the Reichsbank today and will close October 15. Conspicuous advertisements tell the public that it can, must and shall succeed, "else we encourage England to go on fighting."

The banks and insurance companies offer facilities to small investors to pay 10 per cent cash and the rest by easy installments.

The Kruijls have subscribed for 50,000,000 marks.

DEMAND WEALTH CONSCRIPTION

Canadian Labor Delegates Might Strike to Force It.

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—Delegates to the dominion trade and labor congress had before them for consideration today resolutions to the effect that a strike should be called throughout Canada if the government attempts to enforce the conscription law without first establishing effective conscription of the wealth of the country. Debates on the subject indicated that most of the delegates were in favor of the resolutions, which were to come up for a vote later today.
