OFFICIALS THINK SUBMARINE ACTIVITY IS UNDER CONTROL

"Smoke Box," a Device Which Produces Cloud at Contact With Water Proves Successful.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—Unless some new outbreak of submarine activity developed, many officials are satisfied that the situation is fairly under control. Encouraging results have been obtained through convoying of fleets of merchant craft, the loss having been reduced to less than one-half of one per cent. The employment of smoke screens, kite balloons and other anti-detection devices also has shown good results, and progress is being made on the reduction of smoke merchantmen and by painting ships to make them invisible at a distance through a periscope.
In discussing submarine conditions today, Admiral Benson, chief of naval operations, and acting Secretary of the Navy, indicated the department is to know more of its accomplishments hereafter. No formal announcement was made, however.
The "smoke box," a device to be thrown overboard from a vessel when a submarine appears, has proved highly successful in some cases. A great smoke rises instantly when the chemicals in the box come in contact with the water, and under the screen created the vessel has opportunity to change her course and elude the U-boat. Experimenting continues with many other devices. Thomas A. Edison is still at work on experiments to which he devoted himself at the outbreak of the war.
WILSON APPROVES PLAN FOR NATIONAL AERIAL HIGHWAY
Aero Club of America Proposes Air Route from New York to San Francisco With Laterals.
NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—The plan of the Aero Club of America, for a national aerial highway extending from this city to San Francisco, to be called the "Woodrow Wilson aerial highway" has been approved by the President in a letter to Representative Hulbert of New York, which was made public by the club's last night.
Plans to make the map for this highway will be considered immediately by the club's committee on aeronautic maps and landing places and various governmental, commercial and scientific bodies will be invited to carry out the project as soon as possible.
The aerial highway, it is proposed, in addition to running in a straight line from coast to coast, will have connecting branches extending north and south and reaching every important city from Maine to Puget Sound.
