ONE SILVER DOLLAR IS MONEY IN CHINA

Coin Exchanged in Peking for 136 Large Copper Cents; Ten-Cent Piece is "Little Money."

Shanghai is only 120 miles from Hangchow, for instance, and some of the strongest banks in the world are in the former city; but the railway station and telegraph office of Hangchow will scorn your Shanghai money, and you must get it exchanged at the brokers' for Hangchow bills, at 2 or 3 per cent discount.

It would seem that hard silver cash would be good anywhere, but Mexican dollars, the usual medium of exchange—except where the late Yuan

Shi Kai impressed his visage on certain silver pieces—are worth different sums in different places.

Moreover, there is "big money" and "little money." A silver dollar is "big money," and in Peking you can get 136 large copper cents for it, though it is nominally worth only 100 cents; while a 10-cent piece, the size of our dime, is "little money," and you can get only 11 coppers for it.

The difference between big and little money varies in every province. When you come to make purchases, you pay "little money" for some things, and "big money" for others, and it is enough to give one incipient nervous prostration to find out whether or not he has the right change.

U BOAT, INTERNED IN SPAIN, ESCAPES

Crew Had Full Liberty and Officers Had Pledged Word Not to Attempt Flight.

MADRID, Oct. 13.—News that the German submarine which was interned in Cadiz last month had succeeded in escaping shortly after midnight has created a great sensation. All responsible authorities, including the general in command of the arsenal and the chief of the naval district, have been suspended from their functions.

The crew of the U boat were allowed full liberty in Cadiz and the officers had given their word of honor not to attempt to escape.

There was no ammunition on board and no torpedoes or mines.

"GOOD CHEER BAGS" FOR U. S. MARINES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—"Good cheer bags" are to be supplied to the United States Marines serving abroad. Mrs. George Barnett, wife of the major general commandant of the Marine Corps, has started a fund to supply the sea-soldiers with the comforts needed overseas.

An organization called "The Marine Corps Knitting League," with headquarters at Merion, Pa., has already supplied the Marines with extra woolen garments. Friends of the sea-soldiers are doing their bit by helping to make both movements a success.

RELIGION MADE REAL BY WAR, SAYS DOYLE

No Longer a Matter of Faith, but of Experience, British Novelist Declares.

LONDON, Oct. 12.—A remarkable address was made today by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle to members of the Eastbrook Brotherhood at Bradford, on what he termed the new revelation which has been made to mankind by the war.

"The war brought earnestness into all our souls," he said, "and made us look closer into our beliefs and reassess their value. Psychological phenomena which have been provided to the light provide knowledge which must deeply modify our religious views and make religion a very real thing, no longer a matter of faith, but of actual experience."

"This knowledge makes it obvious that Christianity must change or perish. If there was no fall of man what becomes of a large part of the Christian philosophy? As for death or Christ, it was no uncommon thing for a man to lay down his life for
