BUY A LIBERTY BOND AND AID ONE OF THESE

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—As an illustration of the lofty sentiment possessed by men who die on the European battlefield in the war for democracy, and a reminder for Americans who may be backward in contributing to the second Liberty Loan, the Liberty Loan committee made public tonight the last letter written by Captain V. G. Tupper of the Canadian Scottish Sixteenth Battalion, to his father, Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, before his death at the battle of Vimy Ridge last April. The soldier wrote:

"My Dear Father—I am writing one of these 'in case' letters for the third time, and, of course, I hope you will never have to read it. If you are reading it now, you will know that your youngest son 'went under' as proud as Punch on the most glorious day of his life. I am taking my company 'over the top' for a mile in the biggest push that has ever been launched in the world, and I trust that it is going to be greatest factor towards peace.

"Dad, you can't imagine the wonderful feeling; a man thinks something like this: Well, if I am going to die, this is worth it a thousand times.

"I have 'been over' two or three times before, but never with a company of my own. Think of it—a hundred and fifty officers and men who will follow you to hell, if need be.

"I don't want any of you dear people to be sorry for me, although of course you will, in a way. You will miss me but you will be proud of me. Mind you, I know what I am up against and the odds are against me. I am not going in the way I did the first time, just for sheer devilment and curiosity. I have seen this game for two years, and I still like it and still feel that my place is here.

"So much for that. I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart for all your loving kindness to me. This war has done wonders to me and makes me realize lots of things I would not have done otherwise. I could write a book about it, but you know what I mean.

"Good-by, dear father and mother, and all of you. again I say that I am proud to be where I am now.

QUAKERS FAVORED WAR.

With Line of Cannon Defended Capital Against Privateers.

Conscientious objectors in the past have sometimes modified their anti-war views to meet the circumstances of the time—as, for example, in Pennsylvania, in the middle of the eighteenth century. Here a long line of cannon defended the old Quaker capital against French and Spanish privateers on the principle that a defensive war was justifiable.

"The Pennsylvania Assembly," says Lecky, "in which the Quakers predominated, repeatedly voted military aids to the crown during the French wars, disavowing their act by voting the money only for the king's use, and on one occasion for the purchase of bread, flower, wheat or other grain, the latter being understood to be gunpowder."

TWO FATALLY HURT IN TACOMA AUTO ACCIDENT

TACOMA, Oct. 12.—Two were probably fatally injured when an automobile carrying eight ran off a mountain road near Spanaway this morning. The car was demolished and burned. Five were hurt.

Charles Bloom, driver, who began running the car yesterday, is still unconscious and may die. Babe Williams was badly injured. The others hurt are Lillian Gansert, Mac Lawson and William Hall. None were able to say just how the accident happened.

Fourth—Best canned fruit, jars two or more varieties. 1st \$1.50, 2nd \$1.00.
Fifth—Best canned vegetables, five jars, two or more varieties. 1st \$1.50, 2nd \$1.
Sixth—Best five glasses of jelly, two or more varieties. 1st \$1.50, 2nd \$1.00.
Seventh—Best general display of canned goods by one individual. 1st \$1.50, 2nd \$1.00.
Domestic Art.
Eighth—Best piece of knitting.
Ninth—Best piece of crocheting.
Tenth—Best piece of tatting.
Eleventh—Best piece of embroidery.
For each of these last four classes the first prize is \$1.50, the second prize \$1.00.

Policemen's Nicknames.

U.S. MEALLESS DAYS WILL SAVE ALLIES FROM EATLESS DAYS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 13.—If there was ever a time to prove our Americanism now is the time. Our soldiers are on the battle line to help our allies to make the world safe for democracy.

Not all of us can serve in the trenches or risk our lives going over the top across no man's land, but all of us can take part in "Hoover's Drive" to save wheat and meat, butter and sugar for the men who are fighting our battles in Europe. We are not asked to stint ourselves or go without food, but simply to eat wisely and without waste, and to use substitutes for bacon and ham, wheat foods and other concentrated foods that can readily be shipped across the water. One wheatless meal a day, one meatless day a week will keep the non-combatants in Europe from having eat-

less days most of the time. Remember that the person who wastes food during war time is giving aid and comfort to the enemy. This war will not be won on the battle line alone, but on the bread line as well, and every one of us can be soldiers in the fight for conserving our food supplies.

Pledge Card Week takes place between October 21st and 28th. Every loyal housewife should be willing and glad to promise co-operation with the Food Administration Department. We can render efficient service by using home grown supplies, which will save transportation, by practicing the gospel of the clean plate, by cooking no more than necessary, by using corn or rye bread for at least one meal each day, by substituting chicken, rabbit or fish in place of beef and pork, by boiling and baking more and frying less.

The united co-ordinated effort of the Nation will win the war. Do your part and get others to do likewise.

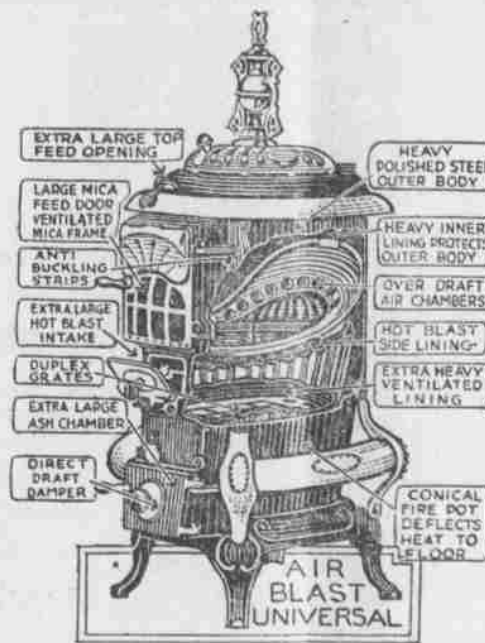
