**COMMITTEE WILL TAKE COAL ORDERS**  
State Fuel Administrator Leaves for Portland to Organize State.

LA GRANDE, Oct. 23.—Oregon will be organized to conform with the national fuel regulation requirements at once.

P. J. Holmes, state fuel administrator, left tonight for Portland where he will immediately establish an advisory committee that will in a measure be a local clearing house for coal orders. Similar conditions will be appointed throughout the state.

Mr. Holmes has been advised by western mine operators that the fuel question is purely one of lack of transportation facilities. One way to combat this, according to a plan proposed, is to station a man at the gateways of Oregon to superintend and expedite movement of coal and prevent side tracking. The administrator anticipates orders to railroads to make coal prior right in shipment to everything except food and munitions.

Western fuel administrators are asking for a director at every mine to pro-rata the allotments to each state upon the basis of actual shipments in the past and present needs each day as the orders are telegraphed in by administrators, and further to see the shipments are moved through on the priority clause with greatest rapidity. The actual needs of Oregon for the next six months will be estimated at once.

**ENROLLMENT AT U. OF O. GROWS IN SPITE OF WAR**

SPOKANE, Oct. 24.—Surpassing all expectations, the total enrollment in the University of Oregon has reached 876, 85 more than the enrollment of 791 at the end of the first week last year. The present number is exactly 27 less than last year's total of students, a figure which was not reached until February. This is considered very encouraging, for it is far beyond the predictions of the faculty that registration would not exceed 700.

The effect of this country's being at war, however, is that the number of men enrolled has decreased, even including the 50 men registered in the new caduance course, who are to enlist on its completion. The number of women in the University has increased from 429 to 456. The number of upperclassmen has fallen off from last year's 221 to 215 through enlistment. Proportionately, the freshman class is larger than last year's record figure of 356, but no figures have been compiled at the registrar's office yet.

**RESTRICT CHRISTMAS PARCELS**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—Christmas presents and other gifts from home for American soldiers in France must be restricted to parcels of not more than seven pounds each.

**SOLDIERS' BALLOTS ARRIVE IN LONDON**

State Commission Prepares to Distribute Them Throughout War Zone.

LONDON, Oct. 24.—The commission appointed by Secretary of State Hays to take the votes of the New York men in the army and navy in the war zone has arrived here safely, and is establishing headquarters for the distribution of ballots to the men at the front or on the high seas.

Capt. Amos J. Peadley and Howard Osterhout were the first of the commission to arrive.

The ballots were sent by two different routes, so that if one set was on the vessel sunk by a submarine another set might get through.

The New York City ballots are expected to arrive soon.

Collapsible ballot boxes will be used, Capt. Peadley said to The World correspondent to-night.

"He has twenty days in which to complete arrangements and hold elections. As soon as the ballots can be collected after Nov. 6 they will be rushed back to the Secretary of State office and distributed to the various election boards."

Many obstacles are to be overcome in reaching the voters, but the War and Navy Departments are giving every assistance and a much larger percentage of soldiers and sailors will be offered an opportunity to vote than had been thought possible.
