These cows were all tested during the year in the Walla Walla Cow Testing Association and were sold on their merits. The records of each cow being given by the clerk. The top price paid being \$96. Hogs brought fancy prices, on brood sow with eight pigs brought \$96, while 150 pound sows brought from \$26.50 to \$29. About 60 tons of hay was sold at \$14.50 and \$15.

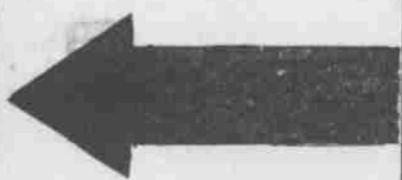
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Let's Stop That Leak
