### FREEDOM'S FRIENDS DON'T SAY "KAISER WILSON"

BOOSTING for the militant suffragettes the Tribune recently carried a story, the purpose of which was to make these women out to be martyrs to the cause of freedom. They are entitled to no such rating.

The United States and her allies are waging a real honest-to-God war for freedom. It is a war for womanhood as well as for the freedom of men, but the silly suffragettes instead of helping our country are devoting their energies to hampering and discrediting the President. They have placarded him as "Kaiser Wilson" and to the Russian Commissioners they declared on their banners that the United States was not a

democracy, and that our government was deceiving the Russian people. "In their case the petition meant insult, disturbance and menace," says a New York World paper. "Tolerance only gave them more affront. Mercy after conviction merely added to their impudence. They were not petitioners. They were law-breakers."

With such a record and with their tactics unchanged, why should these women have any consideration? Why should they come into Oregon with their propaganda? The good women of this state have the ballot, which they secured by honorable and constitutional methods, never maligning the President or getting near the border land of treason. The methods by which they obtained equal suffrage are open to the women of all other states of the Union. Let the militants assert themselves as the Oregon women did and give up their lawlessness.

Meanwhile the friends of freedom in America are devoting themselves to support of the President, not to insulting our commander-in-chief.

### KAISER WANTS THIS MOVE TO FAIL

THE Government's food pledge asks very little of the individual American. So little, in fact, that there is grave danger the individual will overlook the importance of doing that little, day in and day out, over a period, if necessary, of years.

But when the Kaiser heard of this food conservation by individual Americans, he considered the movement such a menace to German victory that he spent large amounts of money and employed large numbers of agents in this country to frustrate it.

What is important enough for the Kaiser to spend time and money to prevent is important enough for every individual American citizen to help to accomplish. Food will win the war; America must supply it.

But it is only by strict, painstaking, daily attention to the government's very modest request that we Americans can insure the success of the war food conservation campaign. Each individual's part is so small as to seem trivial, but the total, if every one does his part, will be tremendous.

The Kaiser knows in his heart that if every one of America's 100 million souls eats a pound less wheat flour a week America will have a badly needed extra 133,000,000 bushels of wheat to ship to its European allies.

He knows that if each of us eat one-third of an ounce less meat fats every day will have 395,000 tons more fats a year for the war.

He knows that if each of us eats an ounce less meat a day we will have 4,400,000 more meat animals every year to feed our allies.

He knows that if each of us eats an ounce less sugar a day we'll have 1,185,000 tons more sugar a year.

He knows that if we individual Americans DO save these things, Allied Europe's hungry will be fed and kept contented in the fight against his starving hordes; and that he, therefore, hasn't a chance to win the war.

He was smart enough to realize that if his agents in this country could sneer the food saving idea out of the individual Americans mind he would stand a mighty good chance to win the war.
