

ITALIANS TO MAKE STAND PLOVE RIVER

Withdrawal From Tagliamento Defenses Voluntary; Well Carried Out. DECISIVE BATTLE IS GETTING UNDER WAY

Berlin, Nov. 8.—Successful German flanking operations cut off the retreat of the Italian forces between Tolmezzo and Gemona and separated the permanent fortifications at Montebelluna from the main body of Italians. It is officially stated.

Washington, Nov. 8.—Home cables stated the decisive battle of the Tyron-Italian drive was entering the first stages with the opposing armies maneuvering for positions. French and British reinforcements are massed back of the Ploive river line. Heavy artillery was rushed from the western front.

London, Nov. 8.—The Italians have been preparing their positions along the Ploive river for the last two weeks. Every Rome dispatch mentioned the withdrawal from the Tagliamento defenses as voluntary and carried out with a minimum loss.

Enemy Attacks Repulsed. London, Nov. 8.—A successful raid southeast of Armentieres and the repulse of two enemy attempts to enter the British lines north of Roubaix is officially reported.

OHIO VOTES DRY BY 1340 VOTES

Wets Claim Error; Official Count May Be Necessary for Final Result.

Columbus, Nov. 8.—The wets announced another error of 864 votes was discovered evidently giving the wets a lead in the prohibition contest.

Columbus, Nov. 8.—Ohio voted dry by a majority of 1340 votes, according to complete revised unofficial figures this afternoon. The wets insist these returns are incorrect, claiming other errors were found. An official count probably will be necessary to determine the result definitely.

GERMAN SQUADRON OFF HELSINGFORS

Believed to be Preparing Attack on Naval Fortifications at Sveaborg.

Stockholm, Nov. 8.—A large German squadron is off Helsinki according to a Haparanda dispatch. It is believed the German fleet is preparing to resume the Baltic naval drive.

A German attack on the Russian naval fortifications at Sveaborg is believed imminent. Sveaborg is a first-class fortification and guards Helsinki.

Food Dealers Are Subpoenaed. Los Angeles, Nov. 8.—The county grand jury issued subpoenas today directing a large number of food dealers in various cities to appear before it tomorrow. The district attorney said this was the first step in an investigation of alleged combinations to increase food prices.

COSSACK REGIMENTS REFUSE ALLEGIANCE

Radical Leaders Seize All Telegraph Lines and Baltic Railway Station.

London, Nov. 8.—It is authoritatively learned the Maximist revolt Wednesday night did not extend beyond the city of Petrograd. All Russian dispatches were delayed.

PETROGRAD, NOV. 8.—THE BOLSHIEVSKI CRISIS HAS APPROACHED AN ARMED BREAK.

Laon Trotsky, president of the soldiers and workmen's council, announced the provisional government was non-existent.

Kerensky has dissolved parliament. Three Cossack regiments announced they would not obey the government. The Maximists arrested several ministers.

Preparing for armed clash with the Bolsheviks, Kerensky has ordered that all private motor cars be delivered to the winter palace. This step is believed to prevent the seizure of these vehicles by the workmen's council.

Kerensky Reported Deposed.

London, Nov. 8.—Petrograd dispatches declared the local workmen's soldiers council had overthrown the provisional government and Kerensky was actually deposed.

The revolting pacifists control the cables completely and censor all messages. It is expected Petrograd dispatches therefore are greatly exaggerated. The revolt is probably only a local affair and the rest of Russia is loyal.

Civil War in Full Blast.

It is believed that civil war in Petrograd is on at full blast, but the censorship hid such news. Radical leaders armed their followers, seized the telegraph offices, Marie palace, state bank and Baltic railway.

WASHINGTON MUCH CONCERNED.

Washington, Nov. 8.—The Russian embassy received a number of cables, but refused to make a statement regarding the Petrograd situation.

Stock Market Affected.

New York, Nov. 8.—The stock market broke badly this afternoon following reports of Kerensky's overthrow. The south and west sent a flood of selling orders.

GERMANS IN MEXICO CELEBRATE.

El Paso, Nov. 8.—The Germans in Juarez, Chihuahua City and Torreon arranged celebrations honoring the Bolsheviks. Maximist successes in Petrograd. Carranza soldiers were invited to attend.

RUSS REVOLT IS LOCAL.

Washington, Nov. 8.—Ambassador Bakhmeteff at Memphis on a speaking tour, telephoned the Russian embassy here that if the Bolsheviks are purely local, the ambassador stated the actions and declarations of the Petrograd workmen's soldiers' council cannot be considered representative of other councils scattered throughout Russia.

The Embassy Insisted It Has No Direct Official Information From Petrograd.
