### BOOKS IN THE TRENCHES

Regarding the English Camp Libraries, Sir Douglas Haig writes in the Boston Transcript: "When it is recognized that in the trenches only one-fourth of the men

are actively on duty, watching the enemy while the remaining three-fourths are concealed at the bottom of the trenches with the field of their vision limited to a few yards of earth, it may well at once be recognized how important to them are any methods of alleviating the long, weary hours of waiting.

I understand most fully the value of reading. Books to men who are out of the line with time on their hands, and little opportunity of getting anything of the sort for themselves, I am, therefore, writing this letter to urge all those at home who have been accustomed to buy books and mag-

azines in the past to continue to do so freely, if possible in increasing numbers, and having read and enjoyed them, to pass them on as freely to the Camp Libraries for circulation among the troops.

If anyone has any doubt as to whether these books and magazines are appreciated by the men for whom they are intended, a glance through the hundreds of letters kept at headquarters will dispel it. "Cramped in a crumbling dug-out, time passes slowly, and the monotony is greatly relieved by a few 'mags' from the old folks at home," writes one officer from the front. "A letter from France brought

the message: "The last parcel of your books came just after we had been felled after the gas attack, and there is nothing like a book for taking one's mind off what one has seen and gone through." "Supply wagons known to contain parcels of books are eagerly watched for by the troops in the Land of Somewhere."
