### Drafted Men Are Discharged.

They were two of the 11 who left here recently as the last increment of the first draft. They report that all other members of the Umatilla county bunch passed the examinations and expect to be sent east very soon.

### La Grande Is Interested.

The city of La Grande is very much interested in the recent ordinance adopted by the Pendleton council as a means of keeping suffrage speakers off the streets. City Manager F. D. Corry has written for a copy stating that such an ordinance is very important at these times. La Grande also asks for copies of Pendleton license ordinances and wishes to know whether the city contemplates taking employees' salaries next year.

### Troop D Needs Pillows.

Sixty-eight boys of old Troop D of Pendleton are sleeping without pillows, according to a letter received from Private Herbert Coffee, and a move has been started among local homes to furnish each with a regulation pillow. Persons who wish to furnish one or more pillows or the material for pillows are asked to send them to Mrs. C. E. Rude on Ulfah street or Mrs. Mae Carney on Willow. Those ladies will see that the materials are made up into pillows and will attend to the forwarding of them.

### Liberty Bond Payments Due.

The local banks call attention to the fact that in order for Liberty Bond subscribers to receive the full

interest on the bonds from the date of their issuance, it will be necessary for them to be paid for in full on or before Nov. 15. A good many people subscribed, intending to pay later, but the banks are required to turn over the money on Nov. 15. If the subscribers do not pay for their bonds before that date, the banks will advance the money but will be entitled to the interest on the subscribers' deferred payments. This announcement is not intended for those who made arrangements to pay on the installment plan.

### Licensed in Vancouver.

Miss Jessie Priddy, 18, of Free-water, and George P. Young, 21, of Vancouver, secured a license to wed yesterday at Vancouver.

### 1700 Food Pledges Signed.

Already 1700 food pledge cards have been sent in to County Superintendent I. E. Young from over the county and several districts have not yet reported.

### Suit On Account.

The Milton Fruit Growers' Union yesterday filed suit in the circuit court against H. L. Durrie for \$469.48 and interest alleged to be due for fruit. S. D. Peterson is attorney for the plaintiff.

### New Rector Arrives.

Archdeacon Lockwood of Spokane, who has been called to take the rectorship of the Church of the Redeemer, arrived in Pendleton this morning and will occupy the pulpit at the regular services tomorrow. While here he will probably decide whether to accept the call.

### Sues On Grain Contract.

Having contracted 1500 bushels of Russian Red Wheat to H. W. Collins last January for \$1.97 per bushel delivered at its latter's warehouse this fall, according to the complaint, Leo Whitlock did not want to fulfill his contract when wheat went a dollar above that figure. Therefore Collins today brought suit to recover \$1275 damages.

### Bunks Die By Hundreds.

Reports of bunks dying by the hundreds on Basin Lake near Diamond, Ore., was sent to E. F. Averill of the biological survey by R. F. Pugsley of Diamond. Last year thousands died on this isolated lake, he says, and he thinks a little scaly fish to be responsible. However, it is possible that the ailment in the mud is responsible. Mr. Averill has reported the matter to Washington for an investigation.

### Composes War Song.

Herbert W. Copeland of this city is the composer of a war song, "Oid Yah, Der Kaiser, Toos," copies of which have arrived at the Warren Music House. The music was arranged by Karl Gilott, also of this city. The song is catchy and the sentiments popular, the chorus running as follows: "To Davy Jones with the submarines, and Yah, Der Kaiser Toos, We'll sail the seas, Old Kaiser, till in side of your 'Is and you'."

### Thief Steals Dress Suit.

Spence Bentley has sworn off on all formal social functions for the winter, not so much as a war sacrifice as because he has no dress suit. He had one until Thursday night when someone else took a fancy to it and stole it from his home while he was down town. This is the second time his home has been entered in the past two weeks. The thief on the previous night having taken all of the clothes of a brother-in-law who is exiled.

### Files Cross Complaint.

In the divorce suit of Louis Rowles vs. Serena Rowles, the defendant yesterday filed her answer and cross complaint, denying the principal charges in plaintiff's complaint. She asks that the complaint be dismissed and that her husband be made to pay her \$250 each month until further order of the court and \$2000 suit money. She also secured a temporary restraining order to prevent him from mortgaging or encumbering his property. Raley & Raley are her attorneys.
