

# NEWS NOTES OF PENDLETON

**Students Make Good Time in Drill.**  
High school students this morning evinced the building in considerably less than one minute in the monthly fire drill. Principal Dr. J. H. Judd expects to better today's mark when the new students are accustomed to the regulations.

**Henry Judd Elects.**  
Henry Judd, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Judd of this city, a graduate of the Pendleton high school last spring, entered last week in the coast artillery, according to word received here. He was attending the University of Washington at the time.

**Hernstein Shipping Apples.**  
Hernstein has already shipped out about 20 carloads of apples this season, according to report brought in from the Umatilla project, and will send out more before the season ends. The crop was very good this year, both in quality and quantity.
