

NEWS NOTES OF PENDLETON

Bids, On Holdman Route.
The postoffice department is asking for bids on the rural carrier route from Pendleton to Holdman which pays \$599 annually. The route is to be covered three times a week. John Thorne has the present contract and it expires July 1.

More Paving Is Started.
The Warren Construction Co. this morning started the paving of Jackson street from Main to Monroe. Monroe from Main to Washington and Washington from Monroe to Main. The laying of hotstuff on the block on Madison from Washington to Wilson is also underway today. The parking on this block is in the middle of the street.
