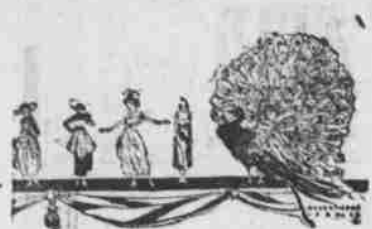


SOCIAL AND PERSONAL
