OVER THE NORTHWEST

REVIEW TAKES TWO HOURS AT CAMP LEWIS

IN COLUMN OF PLATOONS 25,000 MEN PASS BEFORE COMMANDING GENERAL.

CAMP LEWIS, Nov. 21.—Marching in platoons, more than 25,000 soldiers gave to the northwest at Camp Lewis today the greatest martial demonstration in its history and brought home to the thousands of soldiers not in line and the additional thousands of civilians who witnessed the event the magnitude of the preparations for war being made by the 91st division.

It was exactly 2 p. m. when Brigadier-General James A. Frons, in command of the review wheeled his horse about passing before Major-General Greene, and took his stand beside his commanding general to watch the long lines file by. It was almost 4 p. m. when the last platoon had passed, and had the march been in order of squads as commonly seen in street parades, the sun would have risen and sent on the men passing a given point.

Drawn up at the far side of the plain between the two arms of the canyon, the men presented a never-to-be-forgotten spectacle, the row of khaki stretching for two miles to right and left.

Men Do Knitting.

Grade Your Spuds.
PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 21.—Grade your potatoes carefully. Send the big ones to the out-of-the-state market. Sell the smaller ones at home. At least, stop mixing up big and little potatoes in the same sack and trying to sell them together.

This today is the advice of W. K. Newell, federal food administrator for Oregon, who says the spud market is being demoralized by the way in which potatoes are being received by dealers.

Oregon alone must find a market for 4000 carloads of potatoes out of the state because of the large crop this year, he declared.

Play Kid Games.
CAMP LEWIS, Nov. 21.—The games of childhood—crack the whip, pum, pum, pullaway and the rest—are being played by the soldiers in training here.

Army experts say the man who has developed the quickness of head and feet that make for success in such games will make good soldiers. Therefore, hours of play are part of a soldier's training.

Frame—Pressed steel, heat treated, deep channel sections, rigidly braced, narrowed in front for short turning radius.
Spring—Alloy steel. Style, semi-elliptic front and rear, but flat un-der load. Extra long, finely graded, thin leaves. Rear springs wide and underslung.
Front Axle—Timken I beam, drop forged, Elliott type. Timken adjustable roller bearings in hubs and knuckles.
Rear Axle—Timken three quarter floating type. Pressed steel housing, spiral bevel gears. Large diameter driving shaft. Timken Adjustable roller bearings throughout.
Brakes—External and internal, operating on rear wheels, 15 1/2 in. diameter, 2 1/2 in. wide. Positive, soft in operation, and easily adjusted.
Wheels—Wood, artillery type, specially designed heavy spokes 1 3/4 in. thick, twelve to a wheel. Rear spokes bonded for brake drum attachment. Wire wheels, extra.
RIMS—Firestone demountable, universal type.
Tires—Size 34 in. x 4 1/2 in. Make, Goodyear Cord, ribbed tread. United States Cord, Royal tread.
Wheel Base—127 in. wheel base, 55 in. tread.
Engine—Eight cylinder, V type, 1 head, 2 1/4 in. bore, 5 stroke. Displacement 322 cu. in. Cylinders cast on block, four each. Intake manifolds cast integral, exhaust manifolds bolted on. Aluminum crank case. Lower half, separable, acting as oil reservoir. Spiral timing gears, no chains. Single camshaft, with integral cam, quiet operation. Connecting rods, side by side on crank pins. Two bolt cap construction. Die cast silver hubbitt bearings. Three point power plant suspension. Semi-steel flywheel, with starter gear ring bolted on. Large diameter, quiet operating valves. Valve adjustment accessible in the "alley" between the cylinders. All parts fully covered, gear driven fan with friction clutch. Large and accessible oil filler and breather. Pistons and connecting rods removable by dropping lower crank case. Light weight reciprocating parts, sturdy crank shaft. High speed, high efficiency. S. A. E. rating 32.5 H. P. Actually develops over 35 H. P.
Cooling—Cellular type radiator, distinctive design. Circulation by spiral gear driven centrifugal duplex pump. Positive circulation to each cylinder block.
Lubrication—Pressure feed for all bearings. Regulated by adjustable safety valve, which sends overflow to the engine gear case. Spur gear oil pump located in bottom of oil reservoir, self priming by reason of location. Oil passages drilled in crankshaft, feeding oil to all bearings including cam shaft. Oil pipes on connecting rods, carry oil under pressure to piston pins and cylinder walls. Oil filter at pump, allows only clean oil in the pressure lines. Oil pressure gauge on instrument board.
Carburetor—Zenith Duplex carburetor, single float chamber, single air inlet, joined to two separate and distinct spray nozzles, venturi, sliding adjustments, butterfly valves and inlet flanges. Located at top of engine, between cylinder blocks. Fixed adjustments, that cannot wear give uniform and maximum results. Auxiliary air control to facilitate starting, operated from instrument board.
Ignition—Westinghouse distributor in connection with Willard 6 volt 100 amp hour storage battery and Westinghouse generator. Constant-voltage battery ignition without vibrators or multiple-unit spark coils. High velocity, low tension interrupter with spring break, produces uniform spark in all cylinders, and period of contact is practically the same at all speeds. Current reversing switch, reverses current, reducing wear on the contacts.
Starter—Westinghouse starting motor, equipped with Bendix pinion, geared direct to flywheel. Entirely enclosed. Ample size commutator and metal brushes for high efficiency, more power. High starting torque, with minimum current consumption. Push button control accessibly located.
Generator—Westinghouse 6 volt generator, light weight, small, compact. Driven by spiral gears and cross shaft at front of engine through leather universal joints. Automatic regulator maintains constant voltage. Charging current automatically regulated, allowing a large charge when the battery is low, tapering the charge as the battery becomes full. Commutator and brushes of simple design. Single wire system, ground return.
Transmission—Brown-Line unit power plant, selective sliding gear type. Three speeds forward and reverse. 4-8 pitch gears, wide faces, alloy steel, scientifically treated, quiet operating. Teeth beveled, for easy engagement. Solid aluminum cast case and cover. Timken Roller bearings on main shaft, adjustable for end play. Annular ball bearings on counter shaft. Breather in filling cap.
Clutch—Multiple disc, dry plate type, of large diameter. Alternate plates faced with wire mesh asbestos. Operation soft and smooth, enabling car to be started without shock or jerk. Ball bearing clutch release.
Drive—Spicer, tubular propeller shaft with double universal joints, fully enclosed by dust covers, and lubricated. Shaft will not whip at highest speeds. Drive taken through front ends of rear springs. Torque taken by long pressed steel torsion member.
Steering—Glemmer worm and worm gear type, fitted with ball thrust bearings. Adjustable for wear. Non-reversible. 18 in. steering wheel, corrugated rim, inserted aluminum spider. Large diameter column. Horn button in center of wheel.
Control—Left hand drive, center control. Spark and throttle levers on steering wheel. Accelerator, brake and clutch pedals. Emergency hand lever. Ball type gear shift lever, accessibly located.
Fenders—Pressed steel, wide and crowned, closely following wheel contour. Splash shields between running boards and body and between radiator and frame in front.
Gasoline—Tank of 20 gallon capacity hung in rear. Three point suspension. 3 gallon reserve. Stewart vacuum system of feed.
Bodies—Five or seven passenger touring, four passenger close coupled touring, two or four passenger runabout, four passenger clover leaf roadster, limousine, landaulet, brougham, berline, suburban berline, sedan, cabriolet.
