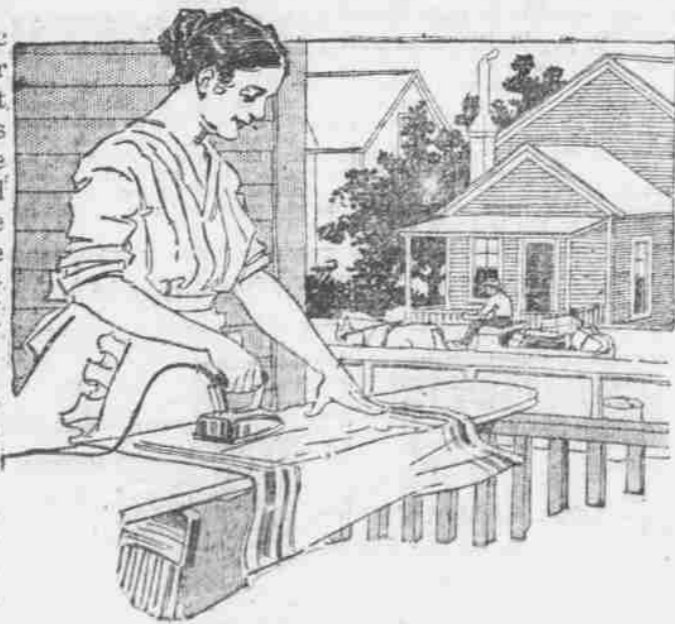

Loggers Form Legion. PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 29.—The Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen came into active aggressive existence today.
