### FLEXNER FINDS DRUG TO REPLACE GERMAN "606."



Announcement is made of the discovery by Dr. Simon Flexner of the Rockefeller Institute, New York, of a new cure for a malignant blood disease. The discovery is regarded by scientists as a triumph over German chemists, who had previously given the world "606" or salvarsan, the discoverer of the late Dr. Ehrlich. The new drug is known as "A-155" and resulted from collaborative experiments at the Rockefeller Institute dating from the beginning of the world war. It means the medical independence of America from Germany. Up to the time of Dr. Ehrlich's discovery of "606" the blood disease had been classified by the medical world as incurable. "A-155" is said to be much less dangerous in use than salvarsan and to be far more effective. It is cheaply produced, whereas the price of salvarsan has made it almost prohibitive.

### DOCTOR SAYS INCURABLE SUFFERERS SHOULD DIE

Dr. Harry J. Halsey, of the German-American Hospital of Chicago, whose refusal to operate on babies who would grow up to die, has again startled the medical world with his announcement that he believes incurable sufferers should be put to death.

### TWO-THIRDS OF LIBERTY LOAN WAS PAID IN CASH

McAdoo, to Put Money Back into Circulation. Will Redeem Certificate Issue.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Secretary McAdoo tonight announced a plan to place in circulation nearly \$2,000,000,000 accumulated in the Treasury as a result of big overpayments received this week from the Liberty Loan.

Three hundred million dollars of certificates of indebtedness due Dec. 15 were called in for redemption on Dec. 8, and another issue of \$100,000,000 of certificates, also due Dec. 15, will be redeemed Dec. 11, both issues at par with accrued interest. This arrangement will leave only the \$655,000,000 due to be paid Dec. 15. The secretary decided to call in the two issues before their maturity when it became evident that the aggregate amount of the payments Nov. 15 on Liberty Loan subscriptions in cash, credit and Treasury certificates was about \$2,100,000,000, three and a half times more than was due on the 15 per cent installment. In other words, it is now disclosed by detailed reports that nearly two-thirds of the aggregate subscriptions to the Second Liberty Loan have been paid in full. Tabulations tomorrow are expected to show that about \$1,500,000,000 in cash was received this week.

### EUGENE MAN GROWS FINE NEW FLOWER

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 29.—W. J. Baldwin, a local chrysanthemum fancier, has succeeded in producing a plant which produced a bunch of three flowers, one of which is yellow one pink and the third, the center one of the group, half yellow and half pink. This result was achieved by the root grafting. A slip from an Oregon yellow plant being grafted upon the root of a pink Greengracious plant. Mr. Baldwin says that he gets much better results from grafted plants than from seedlings or from dividing and resetting roots.

### FORMER SOLDIERS SUBJECT TO DRAFT

PORTLAND, Nov. 29.—Former members of the United States army or navy who have been discharged whether because of expired enlistments or other reasons, are not exempt from the draft. Several instances have come before local draft boards in Portland in the last few days where men of draft age have failed to register under the belief that their previous enlistments had exempted them. Any such who have not registered should see the United States attorney in the postoffice building at once to secure permission to register, thus avoiding criminal proceedings as draft evaders.
