### PATIENT NOT CRAZY: KNIFE REALLY THERE

KENOSHA, Wis., Nov. 29.—Physicians and friends of George Horton, 44 years old, of Bristol, thought him crazy because he insisted that he had a knife sticking in his right thigh. He said he had been stabbed and his assailants had buried the knife in his flesh. No mark was visible and he was sent to an asylum three months ago suffering, it was said, from hallucinations.

Now efforts are being made to restore him to citizenship. The X-ray has revealed the knife deep in his flesh. But it may be too late, as physicians say he probably will die.

### 2950 PROVISIONAL OFFICERS ASSIGNED
